Karolyn Earnshaw Receives Letter Of Thanks From President for Poem

A letter of thanks from President Eisenhower was given for Mrs. W. R. Earnshaw of Cottage Grove who sent the president a copy of a poem she wrote framed with a colored picture of Jesus Christ.

Mrs. Earnshaw's poem, entitled "Christ," is as follows: Christ great as a mountain high, Deep as a valley low, The life of every soul, Gives power to men to climb the steep.

Gives rest to them and required sleep. Gives hope rising as the Sun, That all believers may be one.

On August 1, Mrs. Earnshaw's father, Leslie R. Kuehl, a publisher of Clarkston, Wash., published the poem on a lithographic picture of the Christ. The Bethel Zion Chapel Youth Crusaders, a youth group at Thornton Lane had a copy of this poem framed in a gold desk frame.

The gift was sent to the president August 25. On September 4, the following air mail letter was received by Mrs. Earnshaw from the White House:

Dear Mrs. Earnshaw: The President has received the framed copy of your poem that you recently sent him. He appreciated being remembered in this way and asked me to thank you and the youth group of your church for your thoughtful kindness. With the President's best wishes to all of you.

A second framed poem and picture will be placed in the corridor of the new Bethel Zion Chapel, which has been under construction on Thornton Lane this summer.

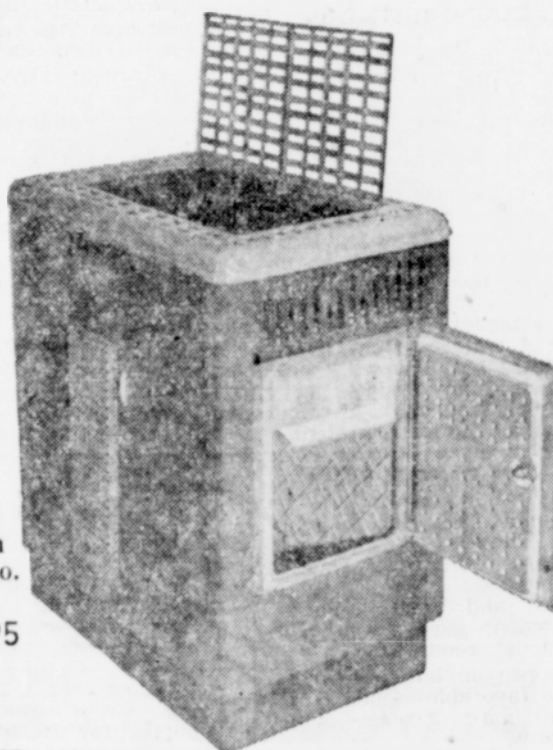
