## Local Teacher Returns After Five Weeks With Work Party in Greece



Members of the team worked eight hours a day to dig three miles of water line 130 centimeters deep. They cooked their food over open camp fires, washed their clothes in the river, lived in tents provided by the Greek government, and used picks and shovels provided by CARE. A Greek engineer was in charge of the project.

Activities planned for the evening gave team members a chance to become acquainted with villagers. There were fiestas, a children's party and meetings with the village council. Several times a week discussions of various phases of national affairs were organized among the camp group.

People in the little village lived almost entirely from the land, reports Miss Roddy. Sixty percent of the men of the island were away - either at sea or in a foreign country - working to provide a living for their families at home in Greece. The unusual situation which resulted was that only women, children and old men were left in the village to wrest a hard living from the soil. The women carried water long distances for all household uses.

While these people in Greece faced serious problems in their own village, their concern was not limited to local conditions. Miss Roddy was impressed with their knowledge of world affairs. Many families had radios. Because sons and fathers were at sea or working in other countries, the villagers were keenly interested in what was going on in other parts of the world.

In addition to her five weeks on the work project, Miss Roddy spent one week each in Athens, Rome and Paris. She returned to Cottage Grove the day before school opened. This is the second assignment Miss Roddy has accepted on a work project sponsored by the American Friends Service Committee. Two years ago she spent the summer on a project in Mexico. Her work there was teaching Mexican children to read and speak English.

Living and working in a small mountain village on a Greek island for five weeks highlighted the summer of Miss Elaine Roddy, English teacher at Cottage Grove High School.

Miss Roddy accepted the assignment from the American Friends Service Committee and worked more directly in connection with a Swiss organization. She was one of two Americans, one Japanese and about 16 Europeans who were in the work group.

Headquarters for this team of young people was the village of Katarraho on Cephalonia, an island on the west coast of Greece. Five hundred people now live in the village which was totally destroyed by an earthquake in 1933. Just after the earthquake, conditions were so deplorable it appeared no one would remain in the village, but the government intervened to prevent the remaining villagers from leaving. At the present time there is no electricity nor sanitation or water facilities for these people, but the government agreed to supply pipes for a water system if one were constructed. The work project on which Miss Roddy participated was planned to aid in the development of the water system.

## The 10 Commandments of Safety

- 1 Treat every gun with the respect due a loaded gun. This is the first rule of safety.
- 2 Guns carried into camp or home, or when otherwise not in use, must always be unloaded, and faken down or have actions open; guns always should be carried in cases to the shooting area.
- 3 Always be sure barrel and action are clear of obstructions, and that you have only ammunition of the proper size for the gun you are carrying. Remove oil and grease from chamber before firing.
- 4 Always carry your gun so that you can control the direction of the muzzle, even if you stumble; keep the safety on until you are ready to shoot.
- 5 Be sure of your target before you pull the trigger; know the identifying features of the game you intend to hunt.
- 6 Never point a gun at anything you do not want to shoot; avoid all horseplay while heading a gun.
- 7 Unattended guns should be unloaded; guns and ammunition should be stored separately beyond reach of children and careless adults.
- 8 Never climb a tree or fence or jump a ditch with a loaded gun; never pull a gun toward you by the muzzle.
- 9 Never shoot a bullet at a flat, hard surface or the surface of water; when at target practice, be sure your backstop is adequate.
- 10 Avoid alcoholic drinks before or during shooting.
