The Frosh football squad had little trouble moving the ball near mid-field Saturday on Curtin Field, but couldn't penetrate the Roseburg Junior High defense when it really counted. Roseburg scored in the second and fourth quarters in what was basically a tight ball game. One bright spot for local fans was the crisp short-passing of freshman quarterback Craig Hansen, who hit his ends repeatedly on spot and hook patterns for short gains. Right half-back Dennis Stringer played well both ways, running hard on the offense and showing at least a rudimentary knowledge of blocking and tackling.

In general, the game gave the Freshmen their first "live" experience and pointed out the handicaps local athletes have to overcome. Roseburg's athletic program includes a complete program for funneling seventh and eighth graders into their ninth grade Junior High varsity. By the time these boys reach the ninth grade they are used to the contact aspect of football and schooled in one system of football. One serious casualty of the game was Dick Giles, who suffered fractures of both arms in his right arm just below the elbow. Dick will be out for the balance of the season but at last report was doing well and will miss no school. The Freshmen meet Springfield Junior High at 4 p.m. today on the high school field. All Freshmen and Junior varsity games played locally are open to the public at no charge.

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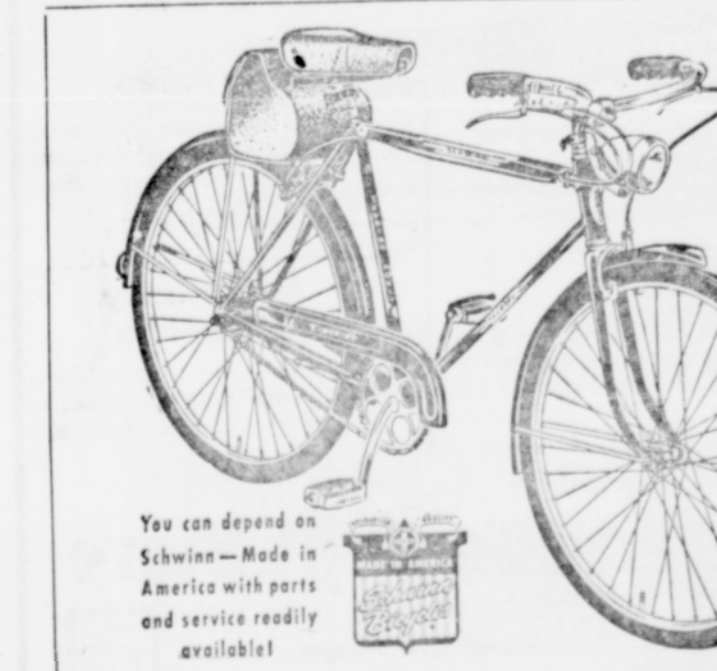
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Jefferson Cubs Win First Game Of Season 13-0

OREGON STATE COLLEGE—California's Improved Golden Bears roar into Corvallis next Saturday to offer the opposition for Oregon State in its first home game of the 1956 season. Kickoff time is 1:30 p.m.

Lions Drop Grid Contest by Lone Point Friday Eve

One point isn't very much as football games go, but as the North Bend game went last Friday evening, it was too much. Cottage Grove started off like they planned on pushing the Bulldogs into the Pacific and won all of the statistical battles only to fall short by that elusive one-point boot executed by North Bend's Gary Hargens.

Cottage Grove won the toss and scored on their fourth offensive effort with less than two minutes of the first quarter used. After rolling up two first downs, Quarterback Leon Hayes failed to both Hoover and Strohe, giving North Bend eleven, plenty of runners to cover and the casually tucked pigskin into right halfback Jerry Northcutt's tummy, going to the opposite side. Jerry packed it 46 yards into North Bend's end zone. On the conversion attempt Hayes handed off to Northcutt again and Jerry was driving hard enough to go more than the necessary two yards, but he had to run over his own right guard and right tackle and they, plus three Bulldog defenders made too large a pile of players for one man to bore through.

At this point the North Bend crowd was seemingly in a state of shock as they very evidently expected only a routine workout from the Groves. Coach Frank Aiken's canines cut up off the floor long enough to punch out a first quarter score of their own, set up by what was probably the turning point of the game, a 22 yard pass from Hargens, which end Kent Carver pilfered from two Lion defenders on a fourth and six to go situation. At that the Bulldogs had to work at getting in the scoring column, needing six downs to the remainder of the game. Hargens' conversion capped this drive.

The Lions came back minutes later with a 38 yard Hayes to Schmidt pass play that left the North Benders hanging on the ropes. Hayes attempted conversion was low and to the left as he had to hurry to get his foot into the ball. The Lions missed two other scoring chances in the first half. Hayes had a first down on North Bend's yard line halfway through the second quarter and couldn't penetrate further and the last play of the half saw a Hayes pass just brush the outstretched hands of receiver and Troy Perkins who had two steps on the nearest Bulldog defender.

Scoring for the game ended with 5:11 to go in the third period as Landes for North Bend punted five yards on a cross back. The attempted PAT was effectively blocked by Cottage Grove's Ted Picknell, who almost called it down Hargens' throat. Northcutt returned the ensuing kick-off 55 yards to midfield and was barely tripped up by the last man who had a shot at him as Grove blockers nearly all found a Bulldog handy. The Lions saw one drive stopped by a fumble in the fourth quarter on a somewhat questionable official's decision. A kick whistle seemed to indicate the end of a play, but as the ball squirted out of Jerry Northcutt's hands it was awarded to North Bend with less than a minute to go and they ate up the time with two ground plays.
