4-H Leaders' Emerald Pin Goes to Mrs. Morton

A quarter of a century completed in the service of Lane County 4-H clubs, Mrs. Leon Morton, London, was accorded highest honors at the 4-H Leaders' Recognition Night held at Pioneer Hall, Lane county fairgrounds, Friday night. Mrs. Morton received the emerald pin for 25 years of service.

More than 80 people attended the annual honor event, and C. L. Carpenter, assistant manager of the U. S. National Bank of Portland, Eugene branch, presented pins, seals, and certificates to 4-H leaders who had served from one through 25 years. A total of 166 men and women, the leaders of 1,300 boys and girls in Lane county's 132 Four-H clubs, were included in the recognition service.

Two leaders honored with Mrs. Morton exceeded her in number of years of service. Mrs. Cora Wearin, Leaburg, has been a leader for 26 years and Mrs. Elvin Lewis, Applegate, for 28 years.

"Service is the performance of labor for the benefit of another," Mr. Carpenter said. "Certainly, this definition describes the efforts of a 4-H club leader."

Darrell Smith, Elmira, a 4-H leader for five years, was unanimously re-elected president of the Lane County 4-H Leaders' association during annual business meeting which was a part of the evening program. Earl C. Jager, Route 3, Junction City, was re-elected vice president. Mr. Jager is the oldest man leader in the county in years of service, having 12 years to his record. Mrs. Creat Marsh, Route 1, Veneta, who received her jew-

eled pin in recognition of her 20th year as a 4-H club leader was elected treasurer. Mrs. M. Vern Stratton, Springfield, a leader for three years, was elected secretary. Verne Bronson, Eugene, was re-elected to the board of directors. New board members include Harold McPherson, Route 4, Springfield; Mrs. Waldo Taylor, Route 2, Creswell; and Mrs. Walter Steinke, Route 1, Springfield. Mr. Bronson has completed one year as club leader. Mr. McPherson, five years; Mrs. Taylor, seven years; and Mrs. Steinke, two years.
