

Lion Squad Second In County Meet

The Cottage Grove cross country squad placed second in the county meet last Friday, trailing Eugene 40 to 28, at Willamette High. Springfield was third, Willamette fourth and Elmira's two-man team fifth.

In J-V competition the Lions tied for second with Elmira. Eugene was first and Springfield and Willamette fourth and fifth respectively.

Dwyl Burleson led the pack home by 75 yards in the pack section, followed for Cottage Grove by Frank Satterwhite in fifth place. The team was handicapped by the loss of Bill Coston, sidelined by arm and head burns suffered in the recent Cottage Grove Gas company explosion. Bill usually has placed in the first 10 in meets this year and his loss might have affected the results. In the J-V meet Paul Macauley placed third and Jim McClanran fourth. The squad will participate in the North Marion Invitational this afternoon (Thursday) and completes the season at the state meet November 10.

Coach Donn Gassaway won't rest too long between seasons as the first day of basketball practice will be November 13, the following Tuesday.

Last Quarter Rally Gives Jeff Cubs Win Over Thurston

Playing in a steady rain on Kelly Field, Jefferson Cubs took their Friday afternoon game from Thurston School eighth graders, Springfield, by a 13 to 7 score. The Cubs took the kickoff and moved down the field. On a fourth down play they stopped on the 1-yard line when three blockers let one man make the tackle. Thurston came back to score in about seven plays on an 80-yard run around their left end after one man had hold of the ball carrier and another one could have pushed him out of bounds. They made the extra point and led 7-0 at half.

After a bad pass from center on an attempted punt, the Jefferson lads took the ball and drove 25 yards for a TD, mostly through the line. A double reverse scored the TD, but a jump pass missed for the extra point so the local boys still trailed 7-6 going into the fourth quarter.

Thurston had the ball two plays when the Cubs' defensive right end intercepted a pitch-out on their 40-yard line. The Grove team again ran most plays through the line. They were stopped once but a 4th down optional pass or run play brought the first down on a pass. The TD was a 9-yard drive through left guard and tackle. The extra point was good to make it 13-7.

As the game ended Cottage Grove had the ball and already had moved about 50 yards down the field. Except for one lapse on defense the team played well. They did not have to punt and had no fumbles or bad centers. The team

showed real determination to win by coming back to score twice and hold the lead. This was Thurston's first loss and the first scores against them this season. The Cubs' record is now three wins and one loss.

Final game of the season is Saturday, November 3, at Springfield High field against Mill Street school of Springfield.

Jefferson Beats Central 6 to 0
