Gas escaping from the valve burst into flame and burned for several hours.

50th Anniversary Edition of Christmas Seals of Interest to Stamp Collectors

Of great interest to philatelists will be the 50th edition of the Christmas seals which will go on sale throughout Oregon and the United States on November 15. The first American Christmas seal, designed and sold in 1907 by Emily Bissell, a Wilmington, Del., social worker is now a rare item for stamp collectors. The first Christmas seal sale in Oregon was in 1908.

Four different seals are used on the sheets of 100 which will be sold through the mails by the 3,000 tuberculosis associations affiliated with the National Tuberculosis Assn. The design by Heidi Brandt, Colorado type lance artist, features a parade of boys and girls in green carrying the red double-barred cross, trademark of the National Tuberculosis Assn. on a white background with lettering in yellow and black. Mrs. Brandt lived at Corvallis, Ore., for a short time when her husband taught at Oregon State college.

The Christmas seals are printed in four-color offset process, and

sets of seven progressive color proofs are available. In order, they are: (1) yellow; (2) red; (3) yellow and red; (4) green; (5) yellow, red, and green; (6) black; (7) the complete design.

Each block of four seals includes two "boy" and two "girl" seals. Across the top of one "boy" seal the word "Christmas" is printed in yellow. The other two carry the word "Greetings". On each seal is the year "1956" in yellow. The copyright mark, a "C" in a circle, and the letters "NTA" are printed in black below the lower arm of the Double-Barred Cross.

Across the top of each sheet of seals is a marginal strip carrying in black the message: "No One is Safe From Tuberculosis Until All Are Safe." The Double-Barred Cross and the words "reg. U. S. Pat. Off. NTA" are in red on each side of the message. At the far right of the strip is the union label imprint, which is different for each printer.

Since the Christmas seals were printed by seven lithographers, seven "key seals" will be needed to complete a set. Each sheet bears the printer's mark of identification on the 56th or key seal, sixth from the left in the sixth horizontal row. The lithographers and their identifying marks are: Edwards and Deutsch Lithographing co., Chicago, "D"; Eureka Specialty Printing co., Scranton, Pa., "E"; Fleming-Potter co., Inc., Peoria, Ill., "F"; Strohbridge Lithographing co., Cincinnati, Ohio, "S"; United States Printing and Lithographing co., Mineola, N. Y., "U"; Western Lithograph, Los Angeles, Calif., "W"; Berlin Lithographing co., Chicago, "B".

The National Tuberculosis Assn. Christmas Seals are used by its affiliated associations in the 48 states, the District of Columbia, Alaska, Hawaii, Puerto Rico, Guam, the Virgin Islands, and the Canal Zone. Canada uses the basic design with minor changes.

Portable TV sets with 8-inch screens are on the market, suitable for plugging in at cottages and resorts.
