

Cross Country Team Is First In Invitational

The Lion cross-country team brought home the "hardware" from North Marion High school last Thursday, beating out long distance teams from 18 other high schools, in winning the Willamette Valley Invitational Cross Country meet. Scores were: Cottage Grove—61; Milwaukie—94; South Salem—103; Hudson Bay (of Vancouver, Wash.)—135; Springfield—164; and Gresham—187.

Scoring for Cottage Grove were Dyrrol Burleson, 1st; Frank Satterwhite, 5th; and Jess Tucker, 8th. Tucker's 8th place finish in a crowded field was the icing on the cake for the Groves, as he turned in his best job of the year. The low total of 14 points for the first three finishing Lions put 1st place within fairly easy reach, as only the first five finishers are used in computing team scores.

In junior - varsity competition

Cottage Grove earned fourth place. Oswego was 1st with 24 points, North Marion 2nd, 119; Hudson Bay 3rd, 130, and Cottage Grove 4th, 131.

Coach Donn Gassaway attributed the win to "team effort" and expressed the hope that the season's record might give the Lions a "good chance" in the state meet Saturday, November 10. This could mean the first Cottage Grove state championship in a long time in any sport, or maybe the first in history. Does any reader recall a Cottage Grove championship? Gassaway will take a hard-earned 2-day vacation after the state meet and then begin workouts with the basketball squad November 13.

Lions Blast Lebanon

Victory No. 3 came to Cottage Grove High school last Friday evening at Currin Field. The visiting Lebanon Warriors fought the Lions "friendly" in a hard-charging, crisp-tackling and clean-blocking way.

The Cottage Grove attack was the best-balanced seen here in many a year, as the yardage was evenly divided: 102 yards passing—93 yards rushing and the local signal-calling exploited Lebanon weaknesses before most spectators had noticed them. The Lion passing attack operated like a skilled brain surgeon's scalpel—only 6 Grove aerials all night, 5 complete, 3 for touchdowns. The only incomplete pass came with only seconds left in the game and at the time Cottage Grove was represented by 10 sophomores and 1 junior on the field.

This appeared to be one of those games you read about in story books, both squads had been well-scouted by the opposition, but Grove Coach Sam Bell made much the better use of his information and this particular contest could almost have been played on a chess-board. Lebanon won the toss and elected to receive and this was their first bad mistake.

Harris' inside boot was scrutinized by several warrior linemen while Lion senior halfback Glenn Beattie hurried on over and pounced on it to give Cottage Grove the ball on Lebanon's 37 yard line with only 9 seconds gone in the 1st quarter. The Groves took 4 1/2 minutes to score from that point with junior fullback Jim Hoover doing the principal damage on 8, 11, and 8 yard runs. Jerry Northcutt kept the drive alive by picking up a vital yard for a 1st down on the 2 yard line, and then punched it over for the first Grove TD one play later. Hayes ran for the first of his three PATs and the scoreboard read 7-0 with 7 1/2 minutes left in the 1st quarter.

Lebanon gained only 1 yard on three plays following the kick-off and the Lions owned the ball again, after a punt, on their own 40. Rolison and Hoover each picked up 3 and then Hayes lofted a soft pass to Rolison in the left flat at the 50 and Ernie showed that track and football DO mix by legging it 50 yards to 6 more points. After turning the corner Rolison simply outran 3 Warriors while many of the Lebanon squad were busy "stopping" a well-executed fake into the line. Score, 14-0, with 4 minutes left in the 1st quarter. The Warriors were held again after the next kick-off and punted to the Grove 10. The Lions were penalized back to their own 5 on the attempted punt return. After 1 first down, the Lions were contained and lost the ball on an attempted 4th down run. Lebanon picked up their only score of the game then by moving from the C.G. 22 yard line to a TD in 7 plays. Following this kick-off and a Grove punt, Lebanon gave the Lions a chance by trying a 4th down run of their own and giving up the ball on their 32. Cottage Grove took 5 plays to score again, with Hayes' 13 yard toss to Perkins ringing the bell. Hayes ran for this third PAT to make the halftime score 21-6.

Lebanon saw 2 second half drives frustrated by Lion defense and several 15 yard penalties. Penalties figured heavily in Cottage Grove's scoring effort as Lebanon's tacklers grew too enthusiastic and drew two 15 yard penalties for "unsportsmanlike" conduct. Hayes passed again for the

4th TD and Northcutt drove over right guard for the 28th and last point with 6 minutes left in the game. Lion reserves finished out the game which ended on the Lebanon's 39. Coach Sam Bell singled out senior guard Ted Picknell, junior center Lyle Chaffee, and senior halfback Glenn Beattie on defense and quarterback Leon Hayes, RH Jerry Northcutt, and fullback Jim Hoover for offense. Seniors Hayes, Picknell, Northcutt, Beattie, Perkins, Gaylen Chapman, Rolison, Bill Benson, and George Woodworth played their last game on Currin Field. Tackles Earl Murry and Dan Simonsen are out for the season with injuries.

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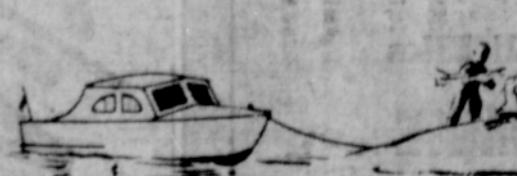
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
