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Never Underestimate a Side Line

One can never tell the potentialities of the so-called side line; that is where a product is manufactured as a side line and now we have witnessed the process by which a side line often grows into a major industry. As we have mentioned before, the state of Oregon is in a transition period, where the methods of manufacturing lumber are undergoing rapid changes and some of the waste products of 20 years ago, which formerly were an expense to the saw mill and went up in smoke in the burners are now developing into important side lines.

O. K. Burrell, professor of business administration in the University of Oregon, writing in the current issue of the Oregon Business Review calls attention to the fact that the automobile was once a side line, but today he says the auto companies make locomotives, electric refrigerators, airplane propellers, etc., as well as a wide variety of other products. No one regards this as a bit peculiar, he says, but not too long ago it was the other way around.

Manufacturers of wagons, buggies and washing machines set up automobile departments and manufactured autos as a side line. In some cases the side line soon became the main product as in the case of the Winston (1898), the Pierce Arrow (1901), and the Jeffrey, which became the Nash (1903), developed out of bicycle manufacturing enterprises and the bicycle lines were dropped as automobiles became popular.

The Peerless car was the outgrowth of the Peerless Winger Co. and the Willys Overland began as a buggy manufacturer, but the buggy was soon forgotten after the company was rescued from financial difficulty by an early supersalesman by name of John Willys.

Mr. Burrell says sewing machines and steam engines may not seem closely related, but the White Sewing Machine Co. of Cleveland, Ohio, developed the White steamer. In 1907 the White family decided sewing machines and autos did not go together and a separate company was organized to take over the making of autos. The White company, however still continued to make sewing machines, but the White Motor Co. made the automobiles.

Many will no doubt recall that shortly after World War II, Sears Roebuck Co. undertook the sale of a small automobile, manufactured by the Kaiser-Frazer Co., an undertaking which was not successful and soon dropped. Earlier the same concern had both feet in the auto business when the company undertook to sell the Lincoln car, built to sell by the mail order concern.

Oregon Has Plenty of Autos

Oregon could easily transport every person in the state in a privately-owned automobile and still have room for the baggage, according to the Oregon State Motor association. Figures compiled on the per capita registration for 1955 shows the state had a passenger car for every 2.6 persons. In this respect Oregon was tied with Michigan for fourth place.

California tops the nation in the number of cars owned with a total registration of 5,299,589, while New York was second. Oregon had 735,947 cars registered in 1955.

Picking Up the Pieces

A good many people are still more or less confused over the results of the November 6 election, when ticket splitting was practiced so freely that the results probably exceeded the fondest expectations of many democrats, who for years, have tried to break the so-called monopoly of the GOP in holding state offices. Just what happened does not seem to be too clear although the election occurred almost ten days ago.

One factor which made lots of votes for the democrats was the way the county tax situation was handled, but other factors which influenced the voters to turn down Ellsworth, the dean of the Oregon congress delegation, are not clear. One feature in a situation of this sort is that the new man regardless of how competent won't be of much value to the district for the first two years.

In looking over the results of the 1952 election, we noted the same precincts not only gave Eisenhower a landslide vote, but other republicans as well, all of which adds to the mystery of the recent election results.

been earmarked for a 4.7 mile four-lane section between Rice Hill and Chenoweth Park at an estimated cost of \$1,391,000.

Between Myrtle Creek and Canyonville, 9.2 miles, the department plans to complete paving of a four-lane route between Jump Off Joe and Louise Creek, north of Grants Pass, was estimated at \$1,815,000 a distance of 4.1 miles.

Farther south, the highway department plans to complete paving of a 3.1 mile stretch of four-lane highway from Louise Creek to Grants Pass at an estimated cost of \$357,000. Grading on this section already is under contract.

South of Grants Pass the department plans to acquire right-of-way for a 22.9 mile route between Grants Pass and Rock Point near Gold Hill. Engineers estimate it will cost \$8,132,000 in federal aid funds to construct a four-lane highway over 14.9 miles of this section.

Between Seven Oaks and Ashland, the department plans to get right-of-way for another 17.3 miles, and to get construction started. Officials estimate that it will take a total of approximately \$8,000,000 to fully complete this stretch for travel.

Records of the construction division in Salem showed that during 1956 contractors completed a two-lane stretch from Goshen to Cottage Grove. Under contract now is a 9.45 mile stretch of two-lane from Shady, one mile south of Roseburg, to Myrtle Creek. This is scheduled to be opened to traffic about December 15 on base pavement. Top coarse pavement is slated for completion about July 1, 1957.

Additionally, a 1.23 mile four-lane section is being built now to Ford's bridge, and a contract has just been let for 1.79 miles of four-lane from Ford's bridge to Canyonville. The remaining strip between Myrtle Creek and Ford's bridge is expected to be under contract by January.

 O. M. Patten, chairman of the Upper Willamette Soil Conservation district plans to attend the five county meeting of soil conservation officials at Harrisburg, November 20. DID YOU KNOW?
 One of the most surprising developments in shoe stores has been the way youngsters have taken over buying their own shoes. By youngsters I don't mean teenagers. I mean children of 6, 7, 8 and thereabouts.

There's no doubt a lot has been learned about bringing up children that never was understood before. (Or should I say a lot has been learned about how children bring up their parents?) One of the important points in modern education is to teach children how to think for themselves, to give them greater freedom in thought and action. I'm sure this is all to the good. But, as in many other things, even a good thing can be overdone, or a good idea applied in the wrong way.

No one says that freedom of thinking and action for young children includes letting them do potentially harmful things to themselves. To use a simple illustration: to help your child learn how to swim you encourage it to go into the water. But you select in advance what water, when to go in, when to come out, and so on.

Why isn't the same policy sensible in a shoe store? Encourage your child to form its own preferences as to shoe types and colors by allowing it to make choices. But you decide beforehand which types and colors should be offered for selection, narrowing down the possibilities to types of shoes that are proper from a foot health standpoint and to colors that best suit the uses to which the shoes will be put. Then don't yield if your child demands a type or color not good or appropriate.

Perhaps some mothers are not as firm about this as they are about swimming because they don't recognize the great potential harm to the child if the wrong type of shoes are worn consistently whereas they do understand immediately the danger of improperly supervised swimming lessons. But the wrong shoes can do great harm, and all mothers should act accordingly. So mothers you will save yourself a lot of worry and money if you have your children fit expertly at
