## Booth-Kelly Tree Farm Opens To Deer Hunting November 24, 25

SPRINGFIELD — The Booth-Kelly Lumber company will open its tree farm gates to hunters on November 24th and 25th. Those areas to be opened and the points of entry are as follows:

Wending area, Mill Creek gate; South McKenzie area, South McKenzie gate; Row River area, Smith Creek and Cedar Creek gates; Saginaw area, West gate. All hunters will be checked in

Results of 1956 hunting as compared to 1955 for those hunters and deer checked through gates:

In reviewing the prospects for hunter success, the most favorable location for bagging a deer appears to be in the Wending area. On the basis of the number of hunters and their success, the Wending area, being twice as large as the other areas listed for hunting, has actually been hunted much less. The figures above reveal a sustained harvest under a hunter's choice regulation. There are indications that we have a "Whidbey Island" on these tree farms.

The lull in this year's hunting season has afforded an opportunity to inspect the results of the previous harvest. From past experience and examinations of the heavy deer sign, there is little doubt but what the area is still over-populated in relation to available food and, if they remain in that condition, a considerable harvest can be expected this winter by starvation. In keeping with conservation and because deer are also a tree farm crop, the Booth-Kelly Lumber company desires that the harvest of deer be taken by the hunter rather than by starvation. The situation very closely parallels a recent article in the November third, 1956 issue of the Saturday Evening Post entitled "We Must Shoot More Deer." In the past five years indications have been that heavier hunting means more available food and consequently more deer. One thing is certain—past hunting practices have thus far failed to solve the problem of over-population to any great extent. There is, of course, a point of optimum yet to be attained and when that point is reached, those who want more deer to eat can both have their cake.

The most difficult point to understand is that heavy harvest before the food is depleted means higher birth rate among yearling does and many multiple births of

## ADDITIONS TO FALL CREEK HATCHERY

Three major additions to the Fall Creek Salmon hatchery, 27 miles east of Waldport, were completed this month according to M. C. Warren, Oregon fish commission director of engineering.

The rearing capacity for fingerling salmon and steelhead at the station has been doubled by addition of a large rearing pond. Another large pond designed for holding adult fish until ready for spawning will also be used for rearing small fish at certain times of the year.

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## Silver Salmon Count High at Oregon Falls

Willamette river silver salmon counts made at Oregon City falls by the Fish Commission of Oregon are the highest on record this fall according to Biologist Earl F. Pufford, who is in charge of the counting.

As of November 14, 1700 adult and 3900 pack silver salmon have been observed moving through the fishway at the falls. This total exceeds counts in previous years by several thousand fish. In addition to the high silver salmon count, nine steelheads and 15 fall Chinook salmon have been tallied at the falls.

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
