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Governor-elect To Address Izaak Walton League

Robert D. Holmes, governor-elect of Oregon, will address conservationists attending the 34th annual convention of the Oregon Division of Izaak Walton League of America at Eugene, December 7 and 8. Rollin Bowles, Portland, chairman and League president, announced recently.

Governor-elect Holmes will be key speaker at the League's annual banquet, December 8. Bowles said. The banquet traditionally honors young outdoor Oregonians selected by League chapters for an expense-free trip to the convention. The young men and women are selected for their interest and achievements in conservation. While at the convention, they will participate in a day-long discussion of water problems.

A second featured speaker will be Mark Hattfield, secretary-of-state-elect of Oregon. Hattfield will deliver the principal address at the convention's opening luncheon meeting, December 7.

At luncheon the next day, the League's Oregon division will present its cherished Silver Beaver awards to Oregon citizens selected for their outstanding contributions to the cause of conservation. Four such awards may be given. An award winner may be selected annually from each of four fields — newspaper work, television and radio, education, and activities as a private citizen.

In convention sessions, the Waltonians and guest speakers will examine a number of vital conservation issues and programs. Bowles said. These include the federal soil bank program, the Klamath Indian reservation termination law, conservation workshops for Oregon teachers, winter man-landowner relations and water conservation.

Trapping Season Opened Nov. 15

Trapping for furbearing animals, one of Oregon's oldest industries and the one which perhaps had the greatest influence on the early development of the great northwest, began for 1956 on November 15.

Although today's trapping is carried out on a much smaller scale than during the early fur trading days, it nevertheless constitutes an important niche in Oregon's economy. Some 1,500 Oregon citizens pursue the elusive furbearers during the trapping seasons either as a full time or part time occupation.

The current trapping season opened on mink, otter, martin, beaver, and ringtail cat and in most of the state on muskrat. The season on muskrat in the Snake

river valley and the Owyhee river has already been under way since November 1. One other furbearer, the raccoon, is at the present time on the unprotected list and may be hunted or trapped throughout the year. On the other hand, the fisher is protected at all times.

Any person trapping on land other than his own is required to have a trapping license which may be obtained from the Oregon Game Commission. In addition, all persons must mark their traps with a brand assigned by and registered with the commission. Information needed by the commission to issue a trapping license includes the trapper's full name and address, plus the fee of \$6.00.

The only additional materials needed are tags required by persons trapping beaver. A \$1.00 beaver tag must be affixed to each beaver pelt. These tags must be in possession of the trapper while he is in the process of trapping beaver. Money will be refunded at the end of the season for any unused tags.
