Tax Revision Is Talked at Third Tax Conference

OREGON STATE COLLEGE—Revision of income tax rates to provide more revenue, repeal of the 45 percent surtax, and fading away of sales tax talk marked the

third biennial state tax conference November 29 and 30 at Oregon State college.

The conference, held every other year just prior to legislative sessions, offers a preview of tax problems and programs that will come before the legislature.

The problems facing the 1957 legislature in January were pinpointed by Senator Lee Ohmart of Salem, a member of the legislative interim tax committee. He pointed out that preliminary budget requests now total \$271,-

000,000, some \$55,000,000 more than the \$222,000,000 appropriated for 1955-57. Looking back 10 years, Ohmart noted that the 1945-47 appropriations totaled \$75,000,-000.

The interim committee report at the conference recommended adoption of a high exemption income tax-sales tax package and repeal of the 45 percent surtax on 1956 incomes.

The 11-member committee, which included nine Republicans, acknowledged however that its program was likely to get a cool reception from the new legislature that will be controlled by the Democrats.

The committee recommended a 3 percent sales tax with food exempt.

The views of labor on the tax problem were outlined by George Brown, director of political education for the Oregon State Labor Council. They differed markedly on some points from the interim committee report.

Labor, Brown said, is "definitely opposed" to the sales tax. It feels that the "progressive income tax must continue to be the base of our tax program," he emphasized.
