Black Butte Miners Work With Foot of Snow at 1100 Tunnel

LONDON—Black Butte had six inches of snow Thursday morning. There was a foot of snow at the 1100 tunnel at the Black Butte Quicksilver mine, but the snow did not stop the men from working. During the cold spell the roads were icy, especially in the early mornings.

One high school boy, driving to school Thursday morning, completely turned his car over, but he escaped injury. The car looks as though it was wrecked beyond repair.

In November, which was below normal in its rainfall, we had only two inches of snow. Mrs. Fred Mills, Black Butte postmaster, has kept a record since 1889, which showed November of that year as having a low of 81 of an inch of rainfall. The greatest amount fell November 1942 which had 14.84 inches of rainfall.

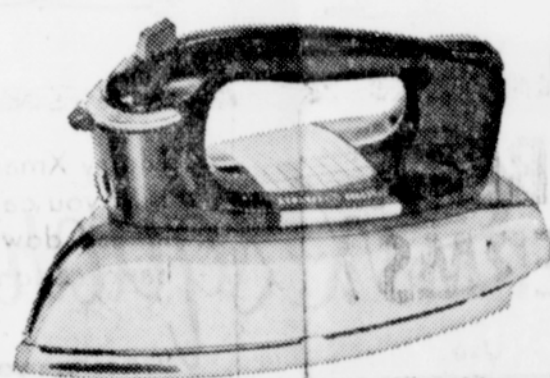
