High School Basketball Schedule For '56-'57 Season Has 22 Games

The high school basketball schedule for the '56-'57 season will include 22 games and opened at the Willamette court Friday. The schedule:

Lions Claw Bulldogs 54-26

Cottage Grove humbled their near-neighbors to the north, the Creswell Bulldogs, Tuesday night to ring up victory No. 1 in this year's basketball campaign. The Grovers were led again by Leon Hayes, who tallied 19 points, ably assisted by Center George Woodworth Jr., who contributed 13.

The Lions hit 350 from the field compared to Creswell's 163, and held their own in ball control. Hayes and Woodworth led in rebounding also with 29 and 22 respectively. McCluskey led Bulldogs scorers with 10, followed by Bates with 8. Cottage Grove led at all four quarter stops—10-8, 25-12, 35-17, and 54-26.

The local crew plays twice more this week, meeting St. Francis Friday night in Eugene, and Douglas Saturday night, also away from home. Next week's schedule consists of a single game against Willamette's Wolverines, in which the Lions will be seeking a reversal of last week's loss. Coach Donn Gassaway used everyone on the bench against Creswell, as did Ernie Davenport in the JV game, won also by Cottage Grove 55-14.

Lions Lose Cage Opener 46-50

Cottage Grove's '56-'57 basketball crew dropped a close pre-season decision to Willamette's Wolverines last Friday at Willamette. The Lions led throughout most of the first half, relying on the consistent scoring ability of forward, Leon Hayes, who finished with 29 points for the evening, hitting 10 for 21 from the field and 9 for 12 from the foul line. Willamette switched to a zone defense early in the third quarter and jumped from a 3-point half-time deficit to a 7 point lead by the end of the quarter. The Grovers solved the zone defense late in the final period in a blazing 40 second rally that cut the Wolverines' lead from 45-38 to 45-44, but the Lions couldn't improve on this in the final two minutes of play.

Forward DeYoung led Willamette scoring with 16 points followed by Koepff's 12 points and center Lengacher's 9 point effort. Sophomore Jim Perkins followed Hayes in the Cottage scoring column with 10 points. Coach Donn Gassaway for "Good Defensive Play." Senior guard Bob Peters and Sophomore Clark Peterson were singled out for containing Wolverine center Lengacher, who scored 22 points against Springfield the previous week. Willamette's starting five had about a 4' height advantage on the local squad and hit 445 from the field, which pretty well tells the story of the game. The Lions were only able to muster a 30 percent shooting percentage as a team. Coach Ernie Davenport's Junior-varsity easily handled a tall, but uncoordinated Wolverine Junior varsity winning by 10 points, even though Davenport cleared his bench in the fourth quarter.

State Ag Dept. Has Open House At Salem Dec. 18

The state department of agriculture will hold open house Tuesday, December 18, in Salem. The public is cordially invited to the various activities of the department as well as see the newly-remodeled Agriculture building and meet Agriculture department personnel at this open house, says J. F. Short, director of the department.

Hours for the event are 2 to 5 p.m. and 7 to 9 p.m. The state agriculture building is located at 12th and State streets, the east side of the capitol buildings group.

Highlight of the OSDA open house will be display of the department's work. Its various laboratories will be in operation. These laboratories include Toads, dairy products, feeds, fertilizers, insecticides, brucellosis, plant pathology and entomology where staff members will show these department operations.

1st Benefit Checks Under New Social Security Setup Out

The first benefit checks under the 1956 amendments to the Social Security Act were paid the past week, Dean Haley, district manager of the Social Security administration, reported. Better than 250 women, age 62-64, received checks dated December 3, to pay them benefits due for the month of November, the first month for which retirement benefits could be paid to women under the age of 65.

The 1956 amendments to the Social Security act reduced the age at which women may qualify for retirement benefits from 65 to 62, with a reduction in the size of payment in some cases to compensate for the additional years of benefits made possible.

Mr. Haley estimated that so far, through November, about half of the women in Lane county who could qualify for payments after age 62 but before age 65 have applied. He suggested that women who qualify and intend to apply should do so during December. January is expected to be a very busy month in social security offices and better service can be offered now.

Farm Land Values Hit Record High; Reasons Outlined

Farm land values, including those in Oregon, have gone up in most parts of the nation in spite of lower farm incomes in recent years.

Value of farm land in Oregon reached the highest point on record at mid-year, reports Mrs. Elvera Horrell, extension agricultural economist at Oregon State college. Farm lands in the state averaged a 2 percent rise between July 1955 and July 1956.

Nationally, farm land values have averaged a 3 percent jump during the same period. Only six states, most of them in drought areas, did not show increases.

What's behind the rise in the value of farm land?

Mrs. Horrell says people who have analyzed the situation feel the rising land values are a result of a strong demand from farmers themselves for more land, and the feeling of many people that farm land may be a safe long-term investment. The demand for part-time farms and houses out in the country and urban and industrial expansion are also seen as factors supporting the higher farm land prices.

The expansion of urban and industrial developments out onto good farm land has started moving at a rate that alarms many agricultural leaders. Mrs. Horrell reports. The soil and water conservation advisory committee of the U.S. department of agriculture has decided to ask the USDA to take steps to help check this rapid conversion of good agricultural land to non-farm uses.

The committee estimates that about 17 million acres of good tillable land have been taken over for industrial and urban housing use in the past 15 years. And they point out that this rate is being stepped up by the present emphasis on industrial decentralization and urban living.
