FAMILIES ENTERTAINED

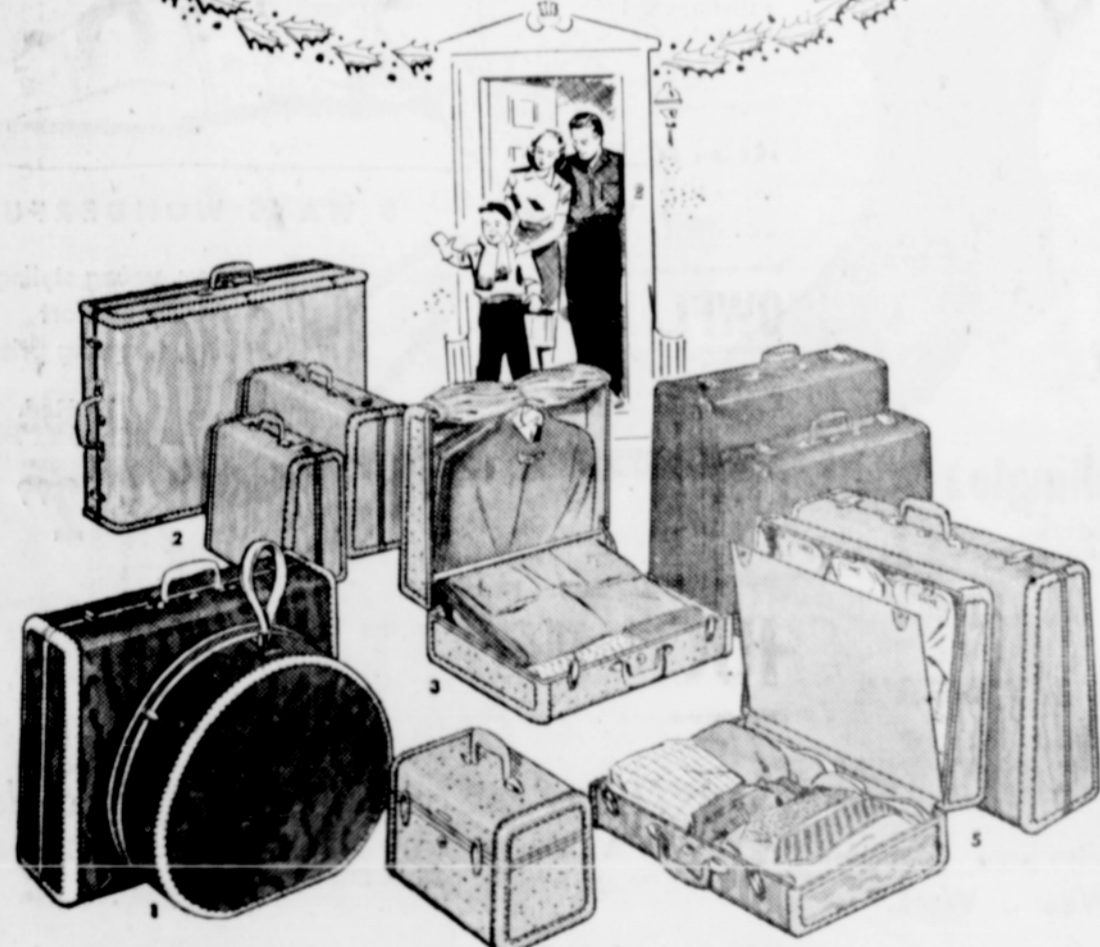
