Mrs. Holt's Book Off Press, Tells Story of Project

CRESWELL—Folk in the Creswell area particularly are interested in the fact that an author and writer of a book lives among them. Mrs. Harry Holt, wife of a local farmer who has made several trips to Korea bringing back needy orphan children, has completed a book, "The Seed From the East," and it is now off the press. The story, as told by David Wisner, tells of the family life of the Holts in their home just west of Creswell and how they became interested in the adoption of orphans from Korea through attending a meeting in Eugene and hearing Dr. Bob Pierce, president of World Vision Inc.

With a deep Christian conviction and knowledge of the great need of caring for the many babies deserted following the Korean War, Mr. and Mrs. Holt decided to "adopt" some of them and take them into their home.

The Holt children, Stewart, Wanda, Molly, Barbara, Suzanne and Linda, also became enthused and soon Mr. Holt was on his way by plane for Korea. After several months in Korea and much legal red tape he was allowed to bring eight children, Joe, Christine, Bob, Mary, Nathaniel, Helen, Paul, and Betty, who are now a part of the Holt family.

Since that time Mr. Holt has made several trips, as have Molly and Wanda, and recently Mrs. Holt made the trip, returning by way of Hawaii.

Anyone wishing a copy of the book may contact Mrs. Holt at Creswell. Profit from the sales is to be used entirely for the relief of orphans. It is a book of 254 pages with 46 illustrations.

The Christmas party with an exchange of gifts followed the business meeting. A guessing game was provided by Mrs. Thelma Smith. Potluck refreshments were served.

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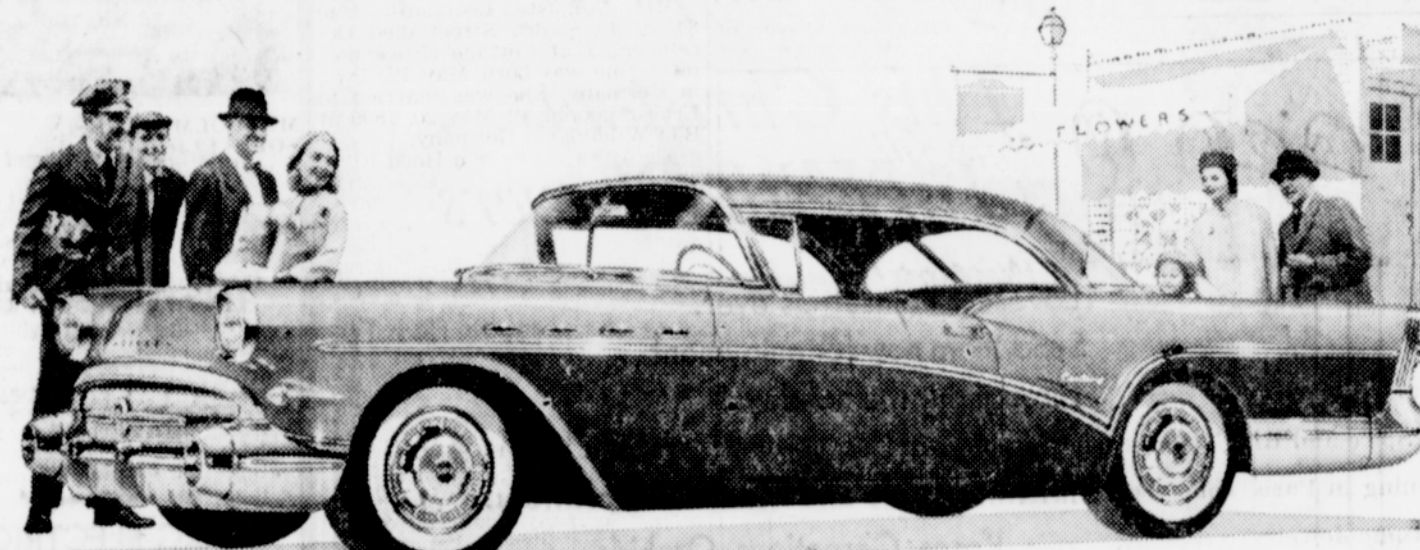
