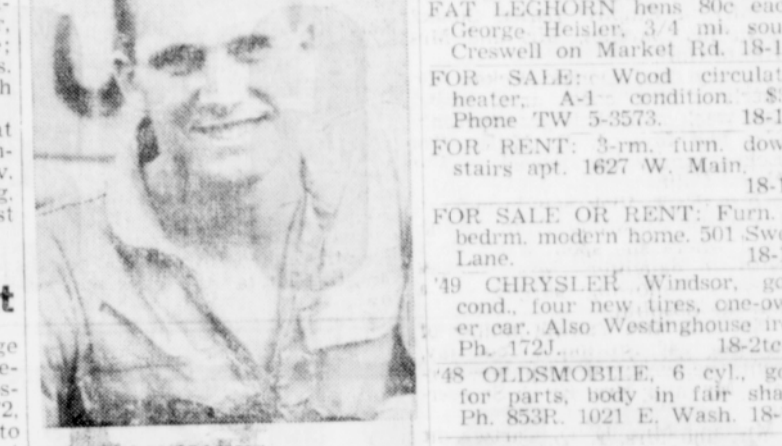

Hi School Training

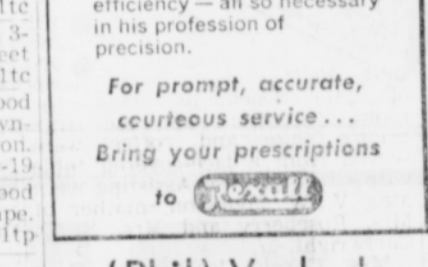
(Continued from Page 1) courses must often be typed. Furthermore, many high school graduates expect to earn part of their college expenses. A background with business training opens to such an individual much greater job possibilities.

More and more high school students are realizing that taking a three year sequence of business courses, prepares them well for accepting a position soon after high school graduation. Actually a number of seniors are at the present time holding part-time jobs in the community doing secretarial work. Following their high school training, others will find jobs locally or in nearby communities.

As a service to students, the business department keeps a card file of seniors showing their work experience and achievements in the business courses. Employers having job openings for typists or for persons to do secretarial or bookkeeping work are encouraged to call Richard Boettcher, head of the commercial department, or Charles Stovall, instructor, for recommendations.

Students completing the stenography course are able to take dictation, handle routine office business, type, file, and operate the adding machine, calculator, transcribing machine, and duplicating machines. Because young people know that business training is valuable, 50 percent of the students in Cottage Grove High school are enrolled in business courses this year.
