Mrs. Dora Allen underwent surgery in a Portland hospital the day after Christmas. At last report her condition was listed as good.

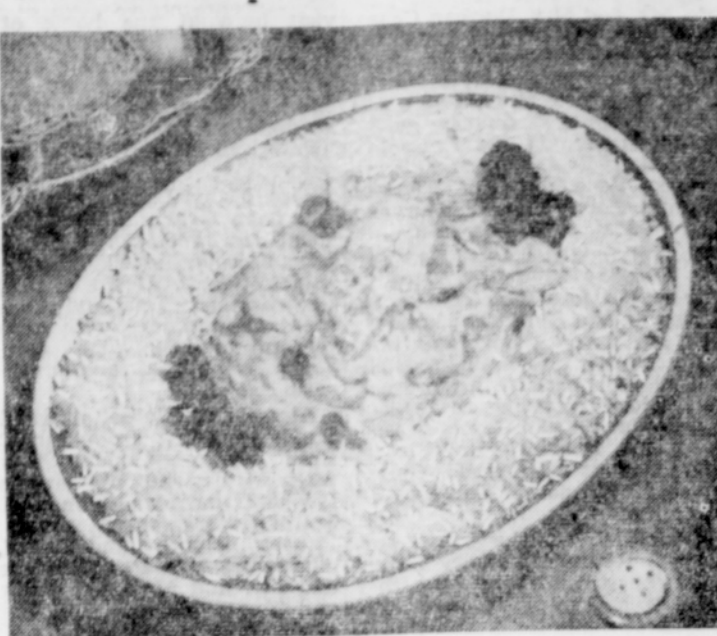
Mrs. Delpha Gay Dies

Chicken Supreme in a Rice Ring



A suggested menu to serve with Chicken Supreme in a Rice Ring is golden squash, molded lime and carrot salad, hard rolls and berry cobbler.

CHICKEN SUPREME IN A RICE RING

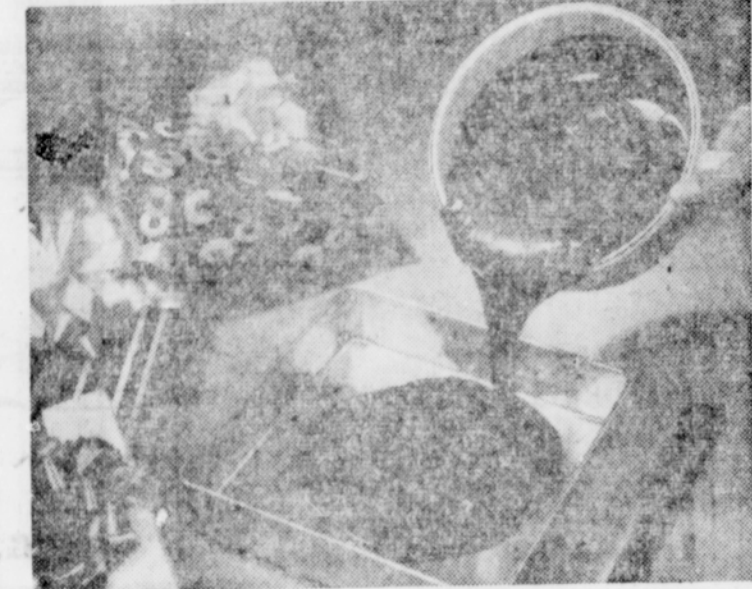
- 1/2 cup butter or margarine
- 1/2 pound fresh mushrooms, sliced
- 1/2 cup flour
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 2 cups chicken broth
- 1/2 cup cream
- 2 cups diced cooked chicken
- 1/2 cup hot cooked rice
- 1/2 teaspoon paprika

Melt butter in saucepan, add mushrooms and cook until soft but not browned. Stir in flour, salt, pepper, and nutmeg. Add broth and cream all at once, stirring constantly until smooth. Cook until thickened, stirring occasionally. Fold in chicken.

Pack rice lightly into a buttered 8-inch ring mold. Let stand in a warm place about 5 minutes. Loosen sides with knife. Unmold onto a warm platter.

Fill center of rice ring with creamed chicken. Sprinkle with paprika. Yields six servings.

2 tablespoons butter
2/3 cup (small can) undiluted evaporated milk
1-2/3 cups sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 1/2 cups (about 16) diced marshmallows
1 1/2 cups (1 1/2 6-ounce packages) semi-sweet chocolate chips
1/2 teaspoon peppermint extract
1/2 cup chopped nuts

Combine butter, evaporated milk, sugar and salt in 2 1/2 quart heavy saucepan over medium heat. Bring to a boil. Cook 4 to 5 minutes, stirring constantly. (Start timing when mixture starts to "bubble" around edges of pan.) Remove from heat. Stir in marshmallows, chocolate chips, peppermint extract and nuts. Stir vigorously for 1 minute or until marshmallows are completely melted and blended. Pour into 9-inch square butter pan and allow to cool. Cut into squares. Top each square with a colored mint wafer if you want to make the fudge extra festive.

Statistics show that in large cities, in the fall and winter months, more than 70 per cent of all persons killed in traffic are pedestrians.



To decrease this alarming figure, the Traffic Safety Association of Detroit has published a booklet to enable the motorist to recognize the "problem" pedestrian and to help the pedestrian himself take steps to safety.

Here is their handy "who's who" of "wacky walkers":

"**Know-It-All Ned**" He's the self-appointed traffic expert. Among his misconceptions are that nighttime is the safest time for pedestrians and that motorists can stop on a dime.

"**Dreamer Doug**" His head is in the clouds so he never stops to think that roads are for cars, as well as pedestrians.

What Makes Johnnie Get Out of Hand—And How to Bring Him Back—
"I used to be able to manage Billy, but now since he's going to school, he won't mind at all."
"Eleven - year - old Tommy squirms if we hug him and acts as if he didn't like us anymore at all. And he used to be so affectionate!"

"Johnnie shows off when there is company and embarrasses us terribly. Recently I tried treating him like an adult in the group and made a great show of a proper introduction. He behaved beautifully and surprised us all!"

Children outgrow not only clothes but also ways of managing them. Discipline which worked well at four is often useless at six, and definitely outmoded at ten. Rewards which worked wonders at five are scorned at 12. Children grow, and so should their methods of treatment grow with them. Parents must be alert to these changes from month to month, from year to year, from crisis to crisis.

Parents should try earnestly to understand the feelings and needs of growing children, their desires to be treated like maturing individuals. Mothers especially often continue to regard their youngsters as preschoolers long after the toddler age has passed. Antagonisms planted in childhood may last throughout life, coloring maturity and later life in marriage and professional situations.

A child should be treated fairly and consistently. If he is given an explanation of why things are wanted of him or forbidden to him, he is far more willing to abide by rules than if forced or nagged into compliance. Good discipline is in reality teaching and learning, not forcing and punishment; this the wise parent knows. Parents who use praise

generously and show appreciation often succeed in guiding their offspring more skillfully than those who threaten. "I'll tan you if you don't do as I say!"

When Johnnie is helped to feel self-confident and happy within himself, he will be less of a problem than if he is made to feel he is BAD. Try to understand how Johnnie feels, what he really wants and needs—and then help him to feel confident in your affection and in his own worth. If Johnnie likes himself and knows that you, too, like him, many of his problems will disappear.

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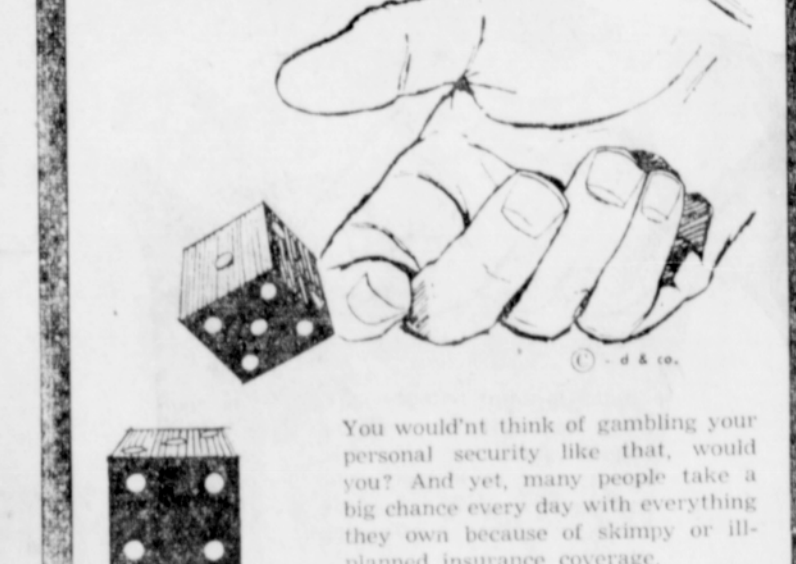
