A friend I know with many many friends writes one letter, has it duplicated, signs each one and has a correspondence filled with pleasant experiences, homey happenings and news of family.

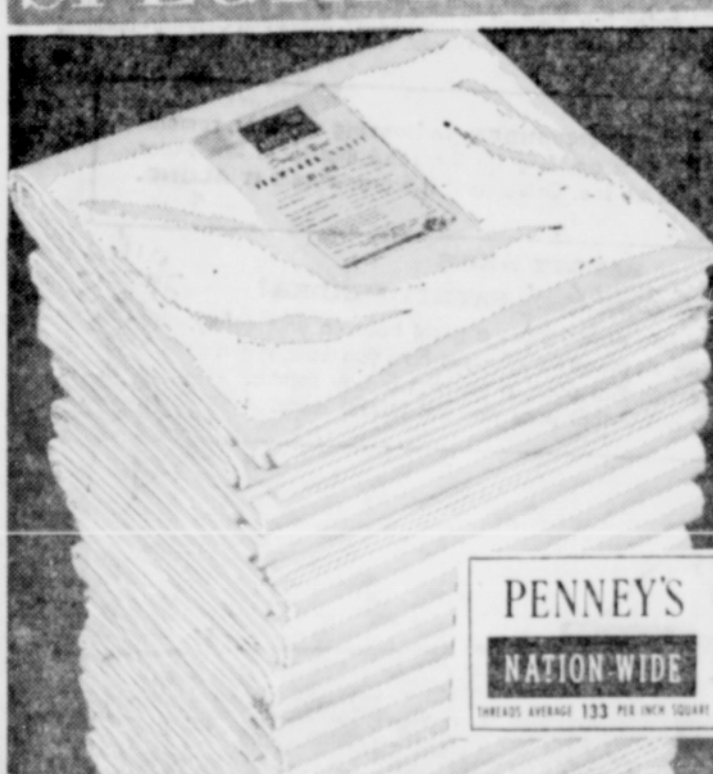
Write that letter. It will mean a lot to someone.
