People Like To Get Off Beaten Path in Wilds

If you don't believe people like to get off the beaten path and into unknown trails in beautiful mountainous country, just ask Norm Minnick, manager for the Oregon Game Commission's Wenaha game management area.

The picturesque Wenaha country lies in the farthest corner of northeastern Oregon near the town of Troy, within the heart of rugged mountainous terrain. Roads into the area are difficult at best, and the only way out is over the same perilous route.

Minnick's associates jokingly refer to the area as being just beyond the last outpost. Because of its remoteness and rough terrain, one would assume the Wenaha country would be about the last place persons would venture into.

But this is far from the truth. Minnick is probably the most visited game biologist in the state, especially during the travelling months of summer and fall. Visitors come from all walks of life and from most of the states. Because so many persons were seeking out the trails "beyond the last outpost," Minnick decided a course of action to record his visitors was a must. Last summer he set up a system of registration, for personal visitors only.

Sociable by nature, Minnick, his wife Opal, and daughter Margaret always have a huge pot of coffee brewing on the stove. All persons who stop seeking information about the area are invited to partake. All visitors who do, however, must sign a coffee log-book, giving their names, occupation, and where they are from. Minnick estimates less than one-third of all stoppers partake of the mug-up.

To date about 300 signatures are entered in the coffee log. 164 of these during a 30-day period in October. Several states are represented in this latter group including persons from California, Idaho, and Washington. All corners of Oregon are well represented.

Hunters appear in the greatest numbers, followed by fishermen, tourists, look-seers for a day, and several house-peepers who wanted to see the inside of Minnick's new residence recently completed.

Minnick refuses to think about his coffee bill. All he knows, it has gone up considerably since he's buying by the case instead of the pound. He insists too, the cases are coming about as regularly as the pounds did before.

The coffee log is getting few names now, says Minnick—winters are slow because of the isolation and almost impassable roads. But come spring when the wild beckons, travellers, Minnick's doors will be open wide day or night. And the big coffee urn will again be in constant operation to welcome all visitors who stop.

Auto Insurance Rates Increased

Revised automobile insurance rates for Oregon were announced yesterday by two rating organizations on behalf of their member and subscriber companies. The new rates are effective January 9.

Experience Unfavorable
"The automobile liability insurance rate revision is based upon the experience of insured motorists within the state," the National Bureau of Casualty Underwriters stated.

"It is part of a countrywide program to adjust rates according to recent automobile liability insurance experiences of the carriers. On the whole the experience

has become increasingly adverse. There are more cars on the road and more are involved in accidents than ever before. We have truly become a nation on wheels with an economy built around the motor vehicle. But this has created an enormous traffic problem."

"The Oregon Insurance Department has approved increases in private passenger automobile insurance rates effective January 9, 1957."

"A thorough review of the experience of insurance companies writing this type of insurance by the Insurance Department revealed that rate increases are necessary at this time."

"One of every six motor vehicles in the state of Oregon was involved in an accident during the past fiscal year and because of this experience the rate increases could not be denied."

Suburban Portland drew the biggest raise ranging from \$9.00 to \$60.00, depending on the class of the driver.
