Schools of Japan, Germany Compare To Those in U.S.

CRESWELL.—The Parent Teacher Student Assn. met Monday evening at the library of the high school, Mrs. J. L. Scott presiding. Reports from the ways and means committee indicated that plans will have to be made for other benefit projects to raise the pledge for the scholarship fund.

John Lyons, program chairman, introduced the speakers for the evening, two exchange students from University of Oregon, John Kageyama of Japan and Frieder Treumann of Germany. Speaking excellent English, each told of the economic and educational status and programs of his country.

Japan, with its 95 million people, covers an area comparable to that of the state of California, according to Mr. Kageyama. There are approximately 450 universities and colleges, 4500 senior high schools and 1200 junior high schools, besides schools for the deaf, blind and other handicapped children. Compulsory education has been in effect since 1919 and every child from 10 years including 19 years must attend schools. At the age of 10 each child and its parents should know what he intends to be and his further education is based on that decision. If he is to be a draftsman, surveyor or similar workman, high school education is not deemed necessary but the child continues his elementary education for four more years and is then sent to a technical school. The universities are not primarily for straight education but more for research work. Only about 20% of the students attend high school and about 5% attend the universities.

Both young men are teachers at home. They will remain in this country until next summer. A question and answer period followed the talks. Refreshments were served in the home economics room.

Mr. Treumann stated that the schools of Germany are very similar to that of our country as to courses offered but the system is much different. Compulsory education has been in effect since 1919 and every child from 10 years including 19 years must attend schools. At the age of 10 each child and its parents should know what he intends to be and his further education is based on that decision. If he is to be a draftsman, surveyor or similar workman, high school education is not deemed necessary but the child continues his elementary education for four more years and is then sent to a technical school. The universities are not primarily for straight education but more for research work. Only about 20% of the students attend high school and about 5% attend the universities.
