

Lions Bow to Creswell in Overtime

Cottage Grove dropped a heart-breaker to the Creswell Bulldogs at Creswell Tuesday evening. The Lions led 15-7 after one period, principally on the efforts of Center George Woodworth, who dunked 3 field goals and 4 straight foul shots for 10 points. The Bulldogs pulled closer by halftime and were only 5 points down then at 20-15. This 5 point lead held up for the Grovers until late in the final period, when Creswell forward Taylor hit 3 fielders in a row on 3 chances to bring the Bulldogs into a 29-29 tie. At this point Grove forward Leon Hayes dropped in a pair of charity tosses to pull the Lions in front, only to be matched by another jump shot by Taylor, which knotted everything up again at 31-31 as regulation time ran out. In the overtime Creswell guard Bates hit 4 straight free throws to close out Bulldogs scoring in 8 counters each to lead the Lions reserves, while Marcotte hit 11 for Creswell's JV's.

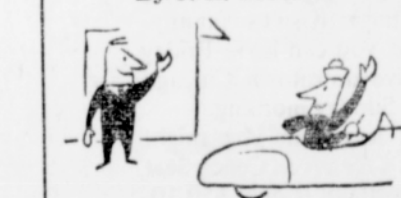

Water Outlook Poor for Summer

The water outlook for spring and summer irrigation is poor at the present time. John Mead of the Upper Willamette Soil Conservation district reported that snow on top of the Cascade summit measured only 16.8 inches as of January 1, 1957, with a water content of six inches as compared to 35 inches in 1955 with a water content of 18 inches. There was only 4 1/2 inches of snow at the Champion mine in the Bohemia district as of the first of the year. Soil district officials say, however, they are not worried about the light snowfall as it will come sooner or later.

Tentative Angling Regulations Set

Only minor changes were proposed in the angling regulations for 1957 at the game commission's public hearing on Friday, January 11. About 50 persons were present at the hearing.

Probably of greatest importance was relaxing the spring chinook salmon bag limit in the Umpqua river to 1 fish daily, 2 fish in 7 days or in possession. The spring salmon season was also opened one week earlier.

Another change would apply to the winter angling season where a special bag limit would apply in the Tumle lakes and Tumle creek, out to Tumle lakes. The special bag limit would be 4 fish a day, 8 such fish in 7 consecutive days or in possession. The bag limit would apply to trout, jack salmon, steelhead and salmon 12 inches or over.

On the recommendation of the Myrtle Point Sportsman's club, a shad bag limit of 25 fish would apply in all waters of the state, with no possession limit. Winter deadline on the Sixes river would be moved back to Dry creek as it was prior to 1956. Several other recommendations by sportsmen's clubs were acted upon favorably by the commission.

Turned down was the request by Tillamook sportsmen to close the Wilson and Trask tributaries to summer trout angling. Also turned down was a request by Corvallis sportsmen and the eastern Oregon sportsmen council to allow the use of live bait in certain waters.

Following are some tentative changes as set by the commission. Final regulations will be adopted following a public hearing on January 25.

Open season: April 27 to October 31 in all zones, May 25 to October 6 for lakes, reservoirs, and their tributaries, within national forest boundaries in the Cascade mountains (includes Pauline mountains).

It is always unlawful to use more than one line or lure and rod or not to closely attend such line or lure and rod.

A separate jack salmon bag limit of 10 fish per day and 20 in 7 consecutive days applies from October 1 to November 15 inclusive, except in zones 3 and 4, a separate jack salmon bag limit of 10 fish per day and 20 in 7 consecutive days applies from October 1 to November 15, inclusive, on streams open to salmon angling.

Shad bag limit: 25 shad per day. Salmon-Steelhead Punch Card: Before angling for steelhead and/or salmon each angler, licensed or unlicensed, must have in his possession a salmon-steelhead punch card which can be obtained free of charge from the office of the Oregon Game Commission or any of its license agencies. Whenever an angler takes one of the above specified fish, he thereupon immediately shall punch his name in the space provided and write opposite it the date, the name of the body of water from which the fish was taken, and the type of fish.

Zone 1
Fish lake (Lincoln county) open April 27 to May 31.
Gold lake open June 15 to October 31.
Fern Ridge barrow pit open to trout angling entire year. Summer regulations apply to angling from motor driven crafts.

Zone 3
Diamond lake closed to angling within 1,000 feet of the outlet. Diamond lake open inclusive, except those portions lying within 450 feet of the mouths of Silent and Short creeks, which are open from July 15 to October 6, inclusive.

Umpqua river spring salmon angling March 23 to June 9, inclusive. Bag limit 1 fish daily, but not more than 2 in 7 days or in possession.

Zone 4
Bolton lake closed to angling.

Zone 8
Antelope reservoir open to trout angling entire year. Bag limit is 10 fish 6 inches or over in length and 20 in possession.

Silver Creek reservoir (Moon lake) open to angling entire year. Bag limit 10 fish 6 inches or over in length and 20 in possession.

Zone 9
Wood lake open to angling. Minam river below Cougar creek is open to salmon and steelhead angling except from April 10 to June 1.

Columbia River Commercial Fishing Considered

Regulations governing Columbia river commercial fishing in 1957 will be considered at a public hearing in Portland by the Washington department of fisheries and the Oregon fish commission in Room 36 of the state office building, Thursday, January 17, beginning at 9 a.m.

One major regulation change to be considered at the hearing will be cessation of commercial fishing above Bonneville dam. According to M. C. James, state fisheries director, the two agencies have previously gone on record as favoring such a proposal upon completion of The Dalles dam. The Columbia river has been diverted through penstocks at the new structure since final closure of the river channel last October.

With an improved blueback run expected back to the Columbia this year, James said the minimum mesh size regulation that has been in effect during blueback season the past two years probably will be discontinued.

Interested persons are invited to attend the hearing. James said recommendations concerning the 1957 Columbia river regulations should be submitted in writing to either the director of the Washington fisheries department, Seattle, or to the Oregon fish commission, Portland.
