Pruning Advice Given in Leaflet Now Available

Don't be slash-happy when you prune your fruit trees, grapevines, or berry bushes, warns W. B. Parker, Lane county extension agent. Overpruning, in general, is more injurious than underpruning.

"All pruning should be done with a purpose in mind," Parker said. "Usually these aims are for shaping the plant or for the renewal or invigorating of fruiting wood."

Although pruning is one of the oldest horticultural practices, many gardeners and orchardists don't understand the principles on which this art is based. Pruning should be a management practice used to improve fruit quality, Parker explained.

Fruit growers are invited to profit from experimental pruning projects carried on for many years by experimental stations and individual growers. Illustrated steps and rules for pruning are given in the bulletin, "Pruning Hardy Fruit Plants," now available from the Lane county extension service office, 1170 Pearl street. Copies may be had by calling DI 5-8418.

Young non-bearing fruit trees should be pruned only enough to select the main scaffold limbs, Parker explained. From three to five scaffold limbs are enough for the average fruit tree. And if only one limb is allowed to form at one point on the trunk, the possibility of splitting and crowding is eliminated.

In all fruit trees, limbs that rub together should be separated by pruning. And enough wood should be thinned out so sunlight can penetrate into the tree.

As trees reach bearing age, more moderate pruning is necessary to maintain a balance between new wood and fruit bearing wood. Heavier pruning is justified only when the yield begins to decrease.

Commercial orchardists, in addition to pruning for fruit quality, also prune for convenience in placing ladders, picking and spraying.

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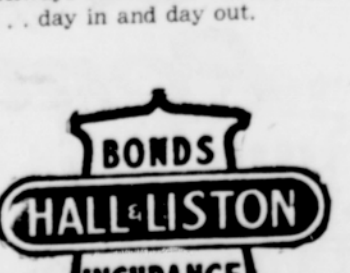
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
