4-H Jr. Leadership Club Organized To Aid Program

Newest youth organization in the county is the 4-H Junior Leadership club organized recently when 10 "older" 4-H members met in the Lane County Extension Service office with Mrs. R. L. (Carolyn) Westrup and J. R. Gorton, county club leaders.

The group voted to have monthly meetings in the extension service office at 1 p.m. on the first Saturday of each month. All 4-H members who were 16 years or older by January 1 and who have completed at least two years in 4-H club work are eligible as members. Officers will be elected at the next scheduled meeting on February 2.

The junior leadership project is new in Lane county and only two years old in the state, explained the 4-H officials.

"It is especially designed for the older 4-H members who have progressed to the point where he has much experience to share with younger members," explained Mrs. Westrup. "It is not necessary to carry another 4-H project along with the junior leadership project."

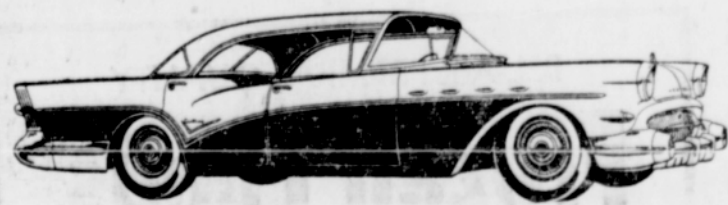

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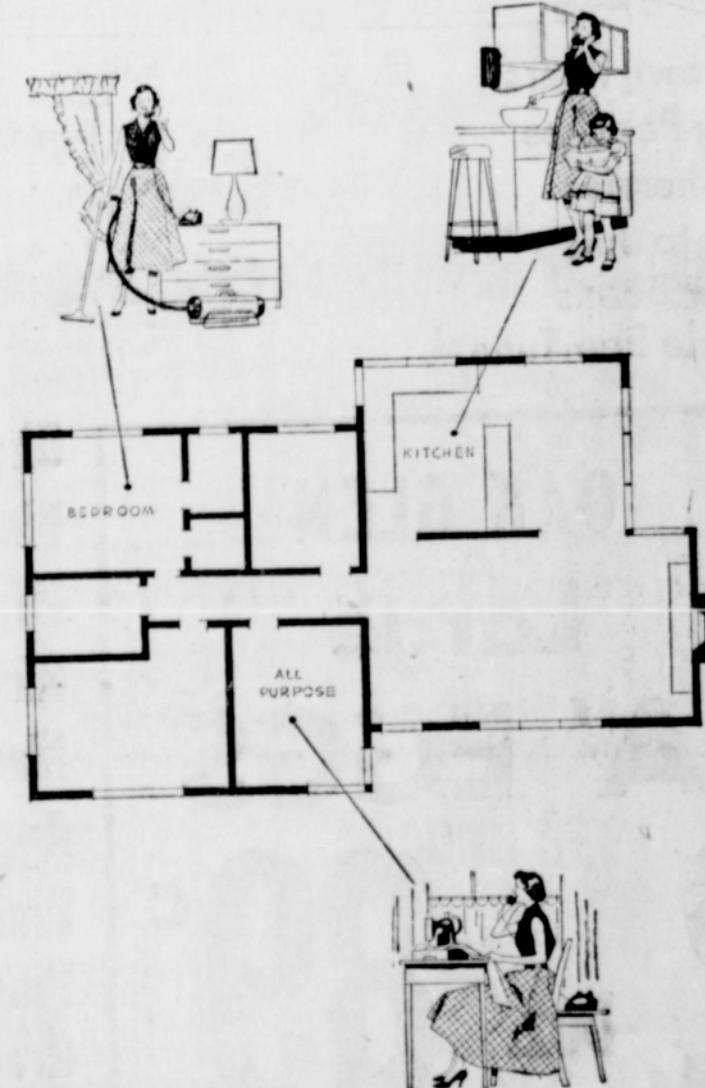


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
