Junior Growers Honored

Three Lane county youth—sons of Lane county horticulturists—will be honored as winners in the National Junior Vegetable Growers' Association production and marketing contest. E. I. Pitkin, manager of the Eugene Fruit Growers, will introduce Dennis and William Detering, sons of Mr. and Mrs. Ross Detering, and Gary H. Gavette, son of Hugh Gavette. All reside along Route 1, Harrisburg.

Oregon State college men who will appear on the program include Spencer Apple, director of the horticultural department, who will discuss use of growth regulators; Norman Dobie, plant pathologist and certification specialist, who will outline progress in disease control in stone fruits and walnuts; and E. Roland Laning, research horticulturist, who will describe new ventures in weed control in vegetables, strawberries, and fruit.

Tom Jackson, soil conservation specialist, will discuss fertilizers and soil fertility. And two diseases of special concern to Willamette Valley growers, bean root rot and carrot browning, will be discussed by Specialists James Baggett and Harry Mack. Entomologist Robert Every will discuss filbert leaf roller control, and Ralph Clark will outline practices among members of the 5-ton strawberry club.

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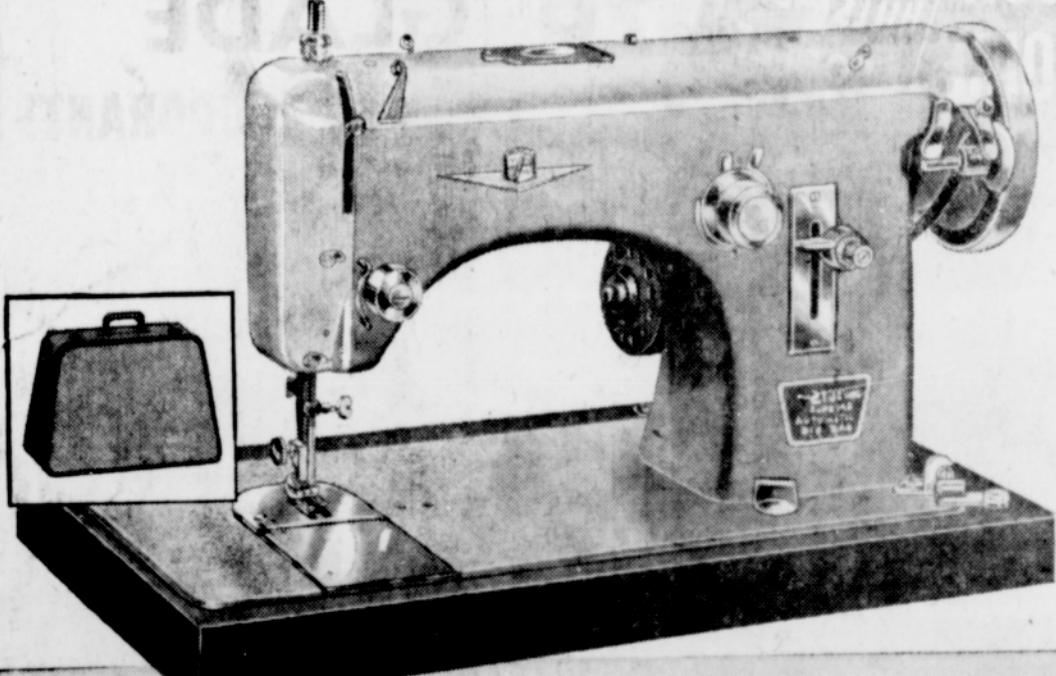
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
