

Rickini Team First in State

The local Rickini team of high school boys took first place in the Junior Boys State Bowling tournament held recently in Salem, rolling a 2810 series. Forty-eight boys' teams entered the competition on the opening day of the men's tournament. Six teams remained to enter the finals, with the Cottage Grove team winning the event. Team members are Leon Hickok, Marvin Hawes, Glen Vertrees, Lee Cook, and Pat Rickard. Pat Daugherty is coach.

Young Rickard had high handicapped individual score of 637. He received a belt buckle and was named on the Rickini team also was given a trophy, in addition to the team trophy.

The boys' competition was held this year for the first time. Last year a similar event was planned for high school girl bowlers on the opening day of the women's state tournament.

Nineteen boys made the trip to Salem in private cars. Some were members of the Moose and M & W Market teams, which were among the 48 entries.

Cottage Grove Rod And Gun Club Has Monthly Meeting

The Cottage Grove Rod and Gun club held its regular monthly meeting Monday night, January 21 following a potluck dinner. Ray Vincent gave a short report on some of the resolutions that were presented at the Oregon Wildlife Federation meeting held in Corvallis January 19 and 20. At the February meeting a more detailed report will be given.

A resolution concerning antelope was passed to restrict a successful tag holder from being able to apply for a tag for a few years thereby allowing another applicant for a tag a chance to be successful. At the present time only 500 tags are available and a lucky tag holder may apply and win a tag after one year of waiting. With the present situation one man may be lucky every two years while the next person may go for a number of years without winning a tag.

A resolution was passed that would require a juvenile hunter to pass a strict examination before the juvenile would be allowed to obtain a big game tag. Another resolution passed would restrict the issuance of elk tags in damage areas, where the damage is caused by 100 elk or less, to hunters of that area. No hunter outside of the damage area would be eligible for these special tags.

These resolutions are not new game laws, but are laws the Oregon Wildlife Federation would like to see enacted. The Cottage Grove Rod and Gun club is a member of the Oregon Wildlife Federation. A discussion was held on planning future meetings. A motion was passed for a committee to plan a big meeting for March and secure a number of prominent speakers in the wildlife field.

Miles Wicks gave a report on what is being done by the Lane County Parks and Recreation commission. He reported that Lane county has been a strong county for establishing parks and promoting recreation and conservation and is the second county in game license sales and yet has never had a man on the Oregon State Game commission. A motion was passed by the club that the Cottage Grove Rod and Gun club write to Governor Holmes to see if it is possible for a new member to be appointed to the game commission. The local club proposes Joe Crepeau of Cottage Grove as the member from Lane county.

At the February meeting the club plans to have as speaker Captain Larsen, head of the game division of the Oregon state police. Entertainment at the meeting included a movie from the Oregon state commission, "Troubled Journey," the life cycle of the steelhead, and two songs by Misses Arlene Thomson and Beverly Brundidge accompanied by Mrs. Dora Bartel of Creswell.

All Alaska Troops Learn How to Ski

FORT RICHARDSON, Alaska—There comes a time each winter when all troops stationed on this post must move out for cold-weather training and a field bivouac of two or three days. Skiing and the use of snowshoes receive the most emphasis. Instructors are officers and non-coms, many of whom attended the Arctic Indoctrination School at Fort Greeley.

For most of the soldiers it was their first time on skis. They ended up by being fairly adept at climbing hills, traversing slopes, or running cross-country and downhill. Most of them progressed to making downhill runs with full packs on their backs.

Infantrymen learned how to transport their equipment over snow. Harnessed four abreast, they practiced the teamwork needed to ski cross-country towing sleds loaded with weapons.

How to improvise emergency shelters, or how merely to keep warm enough for survival, is part of the instruction.

It's all done in temperatures ranging down to 25 degrees below zero.

Gasoline, Fuel Oil Prices Are Hiked

Gasoline, fuel oil and burner oil was hiked a half cent per gallon here last week. The raise in price was effective with the Standard Oil stations on January 17 and a spokesman for the industry said the raise would be general over the area within a day or so. Fuel and burner oil was also advanced a half cent, effective with some companies on January 18.

While the price hike is bad news in a way, the reason assigned to the move was to raise the price of crude oil to enable the marginal oil well operators to start up again.

ALBACORE MAY RETURN
Whether or not albacore will return to Oregon offshore waters in 1957 is the jackpot question. Fisheries scientists who have worked on the mystery are reluctant to give explanations of the albacore's meanderings. There is some evidence that water temperature has an influence on albacore migration.

Some fishermen had predicted the return of albacore early last summer after observing an abundance of albacore food—principally small bait fishes—in northwest waters. This factor may also have a definite bearing on the appearance of albacore off the Oregon-Washington coast.

April 1 Deadline For Filing for \$7500 Exemption by Vets

Winfred W. Smith, Lane county assessor, reminds all veterans who are 40 per cent or more disabled that April 1 is the deadline for filing for the \$7500 exemption allowed under the Oregon state law. These certificates must be filed each year and must be substantiated by a letter from the Veterans Administration or a letter from a doctor and the county health officer certifying to their disability. This letter must be dated within the previous three years to be considered. Unmarried widows of veterans are eligible for the same exemption upon filing an exemption certificate in compliance with the law.

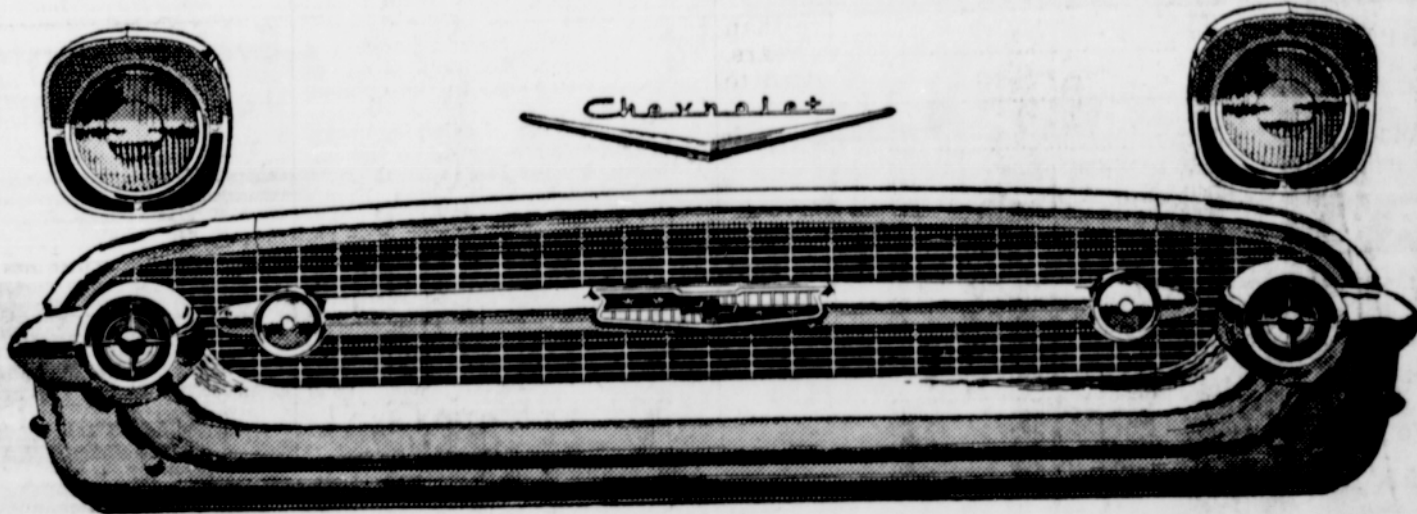
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
