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4-H Members Back the Attack on Highway Deaths

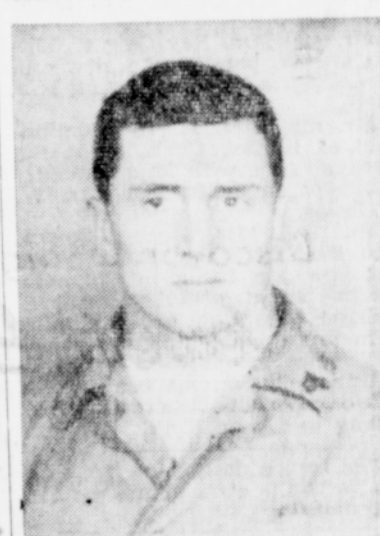

Meat Inspectors Study Sanitation

Twenty-two slaughter establishments of 103 checked by pilot meat inspectors from October 16 to December 7 were found in general insanitary condition. And in that time, 23 animals or carcasses were condemned as unfit for human consumption. Also, the inspectors condemned 512 pounds of spoiled meat in that period.

These figures were compiled by the state department of agriculture from reports of 244 spot visits made to slaughter plants after October 16. They represent additional findings since the department wrote its meat inspection report for the 1957 legislature.

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cles or insanitary practices found most frequently on these visitations are listed. Unsanitary disposal of paunches, found 38 times, tops the list of sanitation faults. Thirty-seven items under sanitation categories were checked. Unsanitary conditions in the hold, pens, unclean floors, walls and ceilings, inadequate hand washing facilities, insanitary toilets, improperly washed carcasses and unclean slaughtering equipment were among items checked most frequently on these visitations to slaughter plants.

The pilot program studies were requested by the 1955 legislature to help the 1957 lawmakers determine whether compulsory meat inspection is desirable and necessary in Oregon, and how much it will cost.

In a suggested program submitted in its formal report to the legislature, released last month,

Porter, Neuberger Join In Opposing Extension Federal Tax on Freight

Sen. Richard Neuberger and Rep. Charles O. Porter said recently they were making a determined effort to prevent the extension of the three percent federal tax on all freight shipments. They contend that the three percent tax acts as a protective tariff against the successful merchandising of northwest products.

The tax, originally enacted as a wartime emergency in 1942, is due to expire on April 1. Neuberger and Porter will join other western congressmen in opposing the extension.

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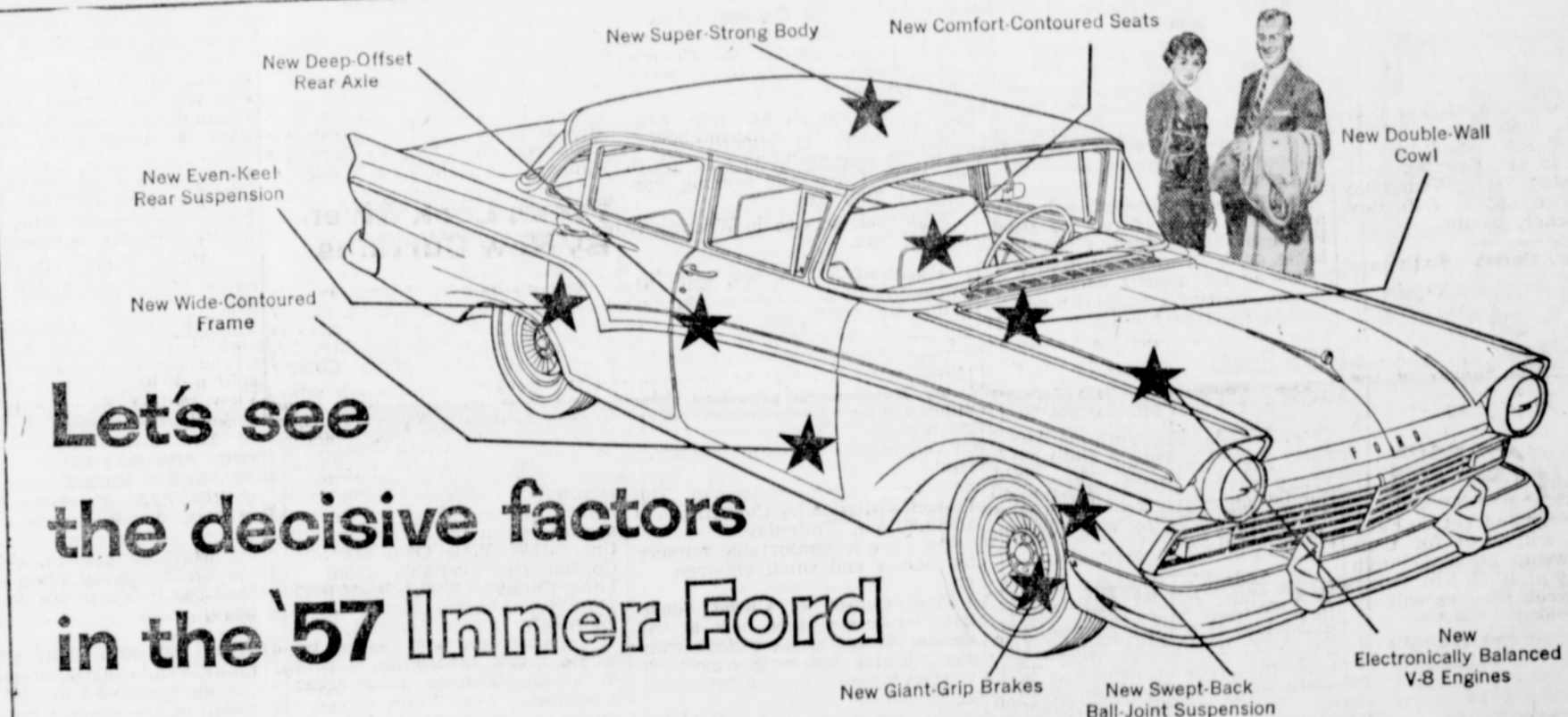
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
