Norman Chazem Pilots Only Aircraft Over Inaugural

Only aircraft allowed over Washington, D. C. the day of the recent inaugural ceremonies for President Dwight Eisenhower was a navy blimp piloted by Lt. Norman Chazem of Cottage Grove. A newspaper clipping telling of the experience has been received by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. L. Chazem. The day of the inauguration Mr. Chazem received a letter from her son just in time to turn on the TV and watch the maneuvers of the blimp.

The young pilot and the blimp which he piloted are attached to the Naval Air Facility Airship Squadron at Elizabeth City, N. C.

Three other crewmen and three navy photography experts made up the blimp's crew. Following the ceremonies, young Chazem wrote, the films were transferred to the ground and rushed to New York where they were shown on a nation-wide hookup and released to all news wire services. The aircraft was so high above the inaugural platform and parade that the crew couldn't see very much, he wrote. Pictures were taken with a telephoto camera.

The young navy man visited here last summer with his wife and small daughter. He is a graduate of Marshfield High school and is a graduate of the Naval Air Cadet program.

Use These Tips To Salvage Foods Hurt by Freeze

Did your canned fruit and vegetables or your winter supply of apples, potatoes and squash take the brunt of the recent freeze? Part of this food supply can be salvaged, according to Mrs. W. E. Riley and Mrs. F. A. Klippstein, county agents in home economics.

Canned fruit and vegetables are safe for consumption if the seal has remained intact. But the consistency will be changed, and the flavor will not be top quality.

If the seal has broken, store the frozen canned goods in the home freezer or frozen foods locked until you can use it. Or, if you have no freezer facilities, thaw the food out and re-process immediately.

Don't let the food thaw and stand in jars with a broken seal, the agents warned. Chemical action takes place that will make these foods poisonous for human consumption.

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Elks Warn Summer Youth Festival In Moscow Communist Propaganda

The Elks have alerted the community against Communist attempts to recruit young people to attend a so-called "youth festival" in Moscow next summer.

Ed Hoover, Exalted Ruler of Cottage Grove Elks lodge, said that warnings had gone to school officials, youth groups, civic organizations, and members of the clergy advising that the "Sixth Annual Festival of Youth and Students," despite its avowed high-sounding adjectives, is a Communist scheme to subvert unsuspecting youth and promote Communist world conquest. Hoover pointed out that the "World Federation of Democratic Youth," which is sponsoring the "festival," is a Soviet propaganda front set up shortly after World War II.

"We are confident that no youngster or parent, having the facts, could be duped by this Communist maneuver," the local Elks leader said. "Our purpose in issuing this warning is to make certain that those facts are known."

Communist agents and fellow travelers will bend every effort to sell the "festival" as a non-political meeting, dedicated to fostering peace through better understanding among the youth of the world, Hoover declared. Its real purpose, however, he pointed out, is to lure our young people to the world capital of slavery so that they may be exposed to the Godless Communist ideology.

Hoover said that he has learned of "Communists' latest attack on American youth from Fred L. Bohn, Grand Exalted Ruler of the Order of Elks. In a letter to Exalted Rulers of the order's 1779 lodges, grand officer Bohn urged the "festival" as a propaganda device "to exploit and subvert young and impressionable minds in order to push the world along the road to Red slavery."

Bohn said that the massacre of Budapest students which set off the Hungarian revolt did much to strip Communism of any appeal to youth. He warned that the Reds, knowing this, will spare no effort to promote the so-called "festival," and that the Communist apparatus in this country will do everything possible to recruit American boys and girls for the trip to Moscow.

"The Communists hope to attract youth from every country—and especially the United States—to increase the propaganda value of the 'festival,' the Elks' national leader said. "Ho this end they have blandly billed it as 'non-political' and larded their announcements with such phrases as 'mutual respect and understand-

ing' and 'the spirit of friendship.' We must make sure that the parents and the youth in every community are informed of the true nature of this 'festival' and on guard against the blandishments of Communists and their fellow travelers."
