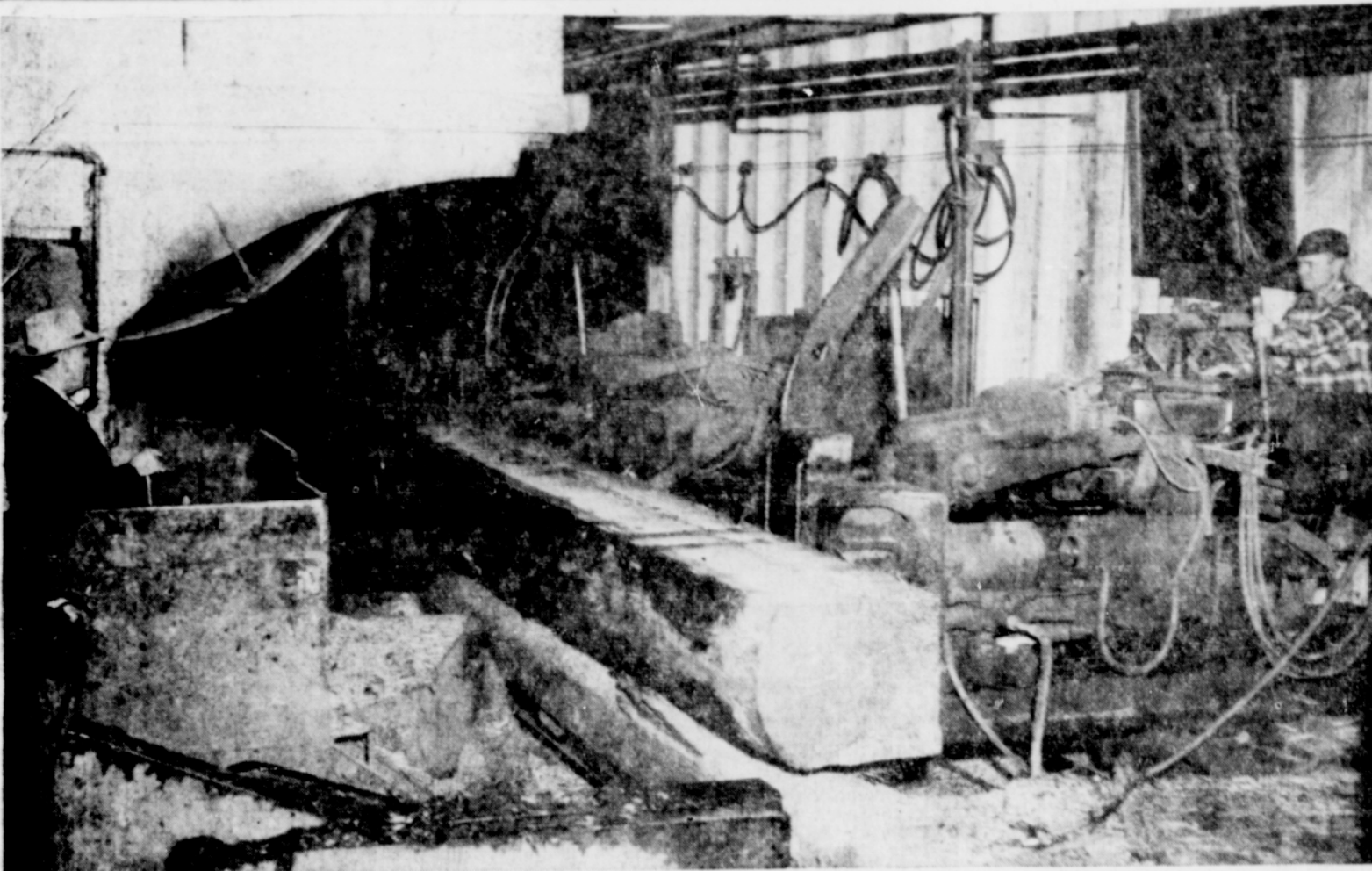

AN ENVIABLE RECORD OF OPERATION marked by very few interruptions was ended December 21, 1956, when the last log was sawed at Woodard Lumber Co. before Weyerhaeuser Timber Co. took over as new owners. Here, Walter A. Woodard, who started with a 20,000 capacity mill employing 20 to 25 men on the Coast Fork February 18, 1920, operates the saw. Four generations, A. L. Woodard, 99-year-old father of W. A. Woodard; Alton and Carlton Woodard, sons, and Woody, Kim and Kristy, grandsons, were

present when the last log made its trip on the carriage. The mill had not lost one working day in the last two and one-half years and had run almost continuously through the years. About 500 men were employed in recent years. Woodard started his career in 1900 cutting wood and hauling it in to Cottage Grove. In 1914 he was master mechanic at the mill at McCloud, Calif., and in 1917 was erecting engineer at Weed, Calif. He has built and overhauled about 18 mills in his long career. —(Clark Photo)

High School Seniors to Investigate Scholarship Possibilities in February

In the next month graduating seniors at Cottage Grove High school who plan to attend college or take some other kind of advanced vocational training will be investigating scholarship possibilities. Numerous scholarships are available, but competition for them is keen also.
While qualifications for scholarships vary with the individual, college or group sponsoring the financial aid program, certain requirements are a part of nearly every program. To qualify for most scholarships, a student must

be in the upper third of his class scholastically. Sometimes the requirement is much higher—upper 10 percent or five percent. A student must also show characteristics of service and leadership, and two to four character recommendations are required.
Most scholarships are given only to students needing financial aid, but special merit awards are often made to individuals who are deserving of recognition, but who do not need financial assistance. The Oregon Dads Special Honors Award and Leadership Award are examples of this type of recognition.

While many scholarships are available throughout Oregon and the West, most of them fall under one of four types of programs. Most colleges have their own scholarships. In addition other scholarships are available in specific fields—science, nursing, elementary education, forestry, etc. Industry is providing more and more scholarships. Often a student winning such assistance can choose to attend any one of a number of accredited colleges throughout the U.S.
Local interest in providing scholarships has grown the past three years. Last year two \$50 scholarships were provided by the Cottage Grove High School PTA, a \$50 one by Southern Lane County Classroom Teachers, one by the local high school chapter of Future Business Leaders of America, one by the Business and Professional Women and one by the Women of the Moose.
Scholarships in nursing and for attendance at beauty college and business college also have been won by Cottage Grove high school seniors in recent years. Scholarships are awarded at commencement exercises each year.

Miss LaVina Eriksen spent last Thursday and Friday night with Shirley Raymond at Cottage Grove.

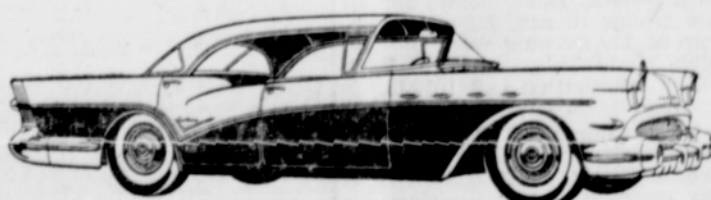

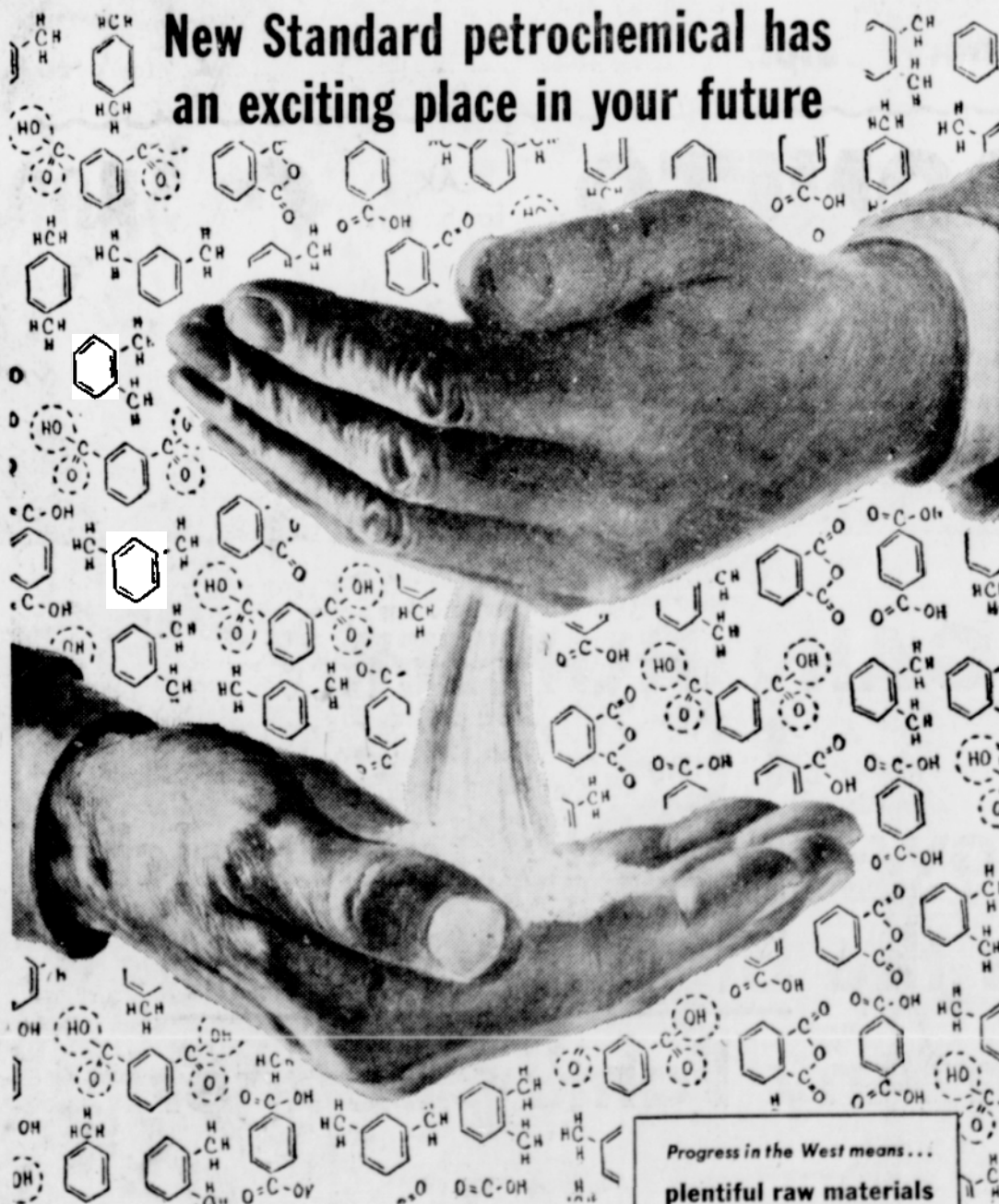
