

JV's Break Loss Streak 52 to 49

The Lion Junior Varsity returned to winning ways against Douglas High's reserves Saturday night to snap a string of defeats stretching back over a couple of weeks. The Groves were led by center Gordie Kronberger with 15 points and forward Jimmy Perkins with 13, while Trojans Nelson Mills and Jack McClenon each dropped in 10. Cottage Grove started fast and finished slow, they led 12-4 and 30-19 at the first two quarter stops and by 13 at 44-31 after three periods, but Douglas threatened in the final quarter, pulling to within 4 points at 48-44 with 3 1/2 minutes left, as Mills hit 3 fielders and 3 foul tosses in very short order.

Cochran Davenport substituted his regulars back into the fray and they managed to trade points evenly with the opposition to hold the 4 point lead until the final buzzer. The sophomore will play Eugene's sophomores Friday afternoon, while the varsity will make the overnight foray to the coast tomorrow.

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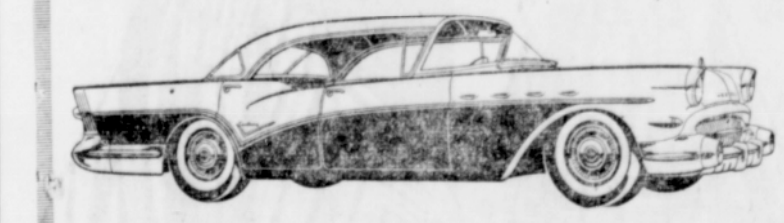

C.G. Lions Upset Indians 54 to 52

Cottage Grove pulled off what was probably the first upset of this year's District 5-A-1 action last Friday evening on the Roseburg court. Hayes slipped in 32 counters to nicely match last week's 34 point effort against Eugene and now has a 24 point average in 3 league contests. First quarter scoring found the Lions out front 8-7, despite an early 6-0 Roseburg bulge, as Hayes dunked his only four chances at the free-throw line the whole game and a single field goal Roseburg rallied in the second period, mainly on Indian ace Bill Oerding's fielders and one foul toss and owned a 2 point edge, 26-24, at halftime.

The Lions roared to a 42-40 advantage after 3 as Hayes hit 10 and he was aided by single fielders from Peters, Woodworth, and Picknell, who also dropped in a pair of charity tosses. Oerding again led the Indians with 8 points in this period.

Just as the final score is the only one that counts, the final quarter of any casaba contest is the one that really matters, and the Lions had it when it really counted, especially Hayes. The lead bounced back and forth like a ping-pong ball all through a long, long 7 minutes and 2 seconds until the score was all even at 52-52.

Through the final minute Grove controlled on sharp passing, until with just 8 seconds left the cry went up, "Give It to Hayes." The Lions did just that and Leon cooperated by bouncing in a jump shot from the head of the key, as the clock ran out, to register his 9th straight field goal in the second half without a miss. This was a slight reversal of form—the Roseburg newspaper's pre-game write-up spoke condescendingly at the Grove team, and Roseburg used to be (last week) rank-d #8 in the whole state. The Indians now find themselves back with the "also-rans" in league standings with a 1-2 record just exactly like Cottage Grove's.

The Grove's small, but loyal, rooting section took up the chant early for Coach Donn Gassaway's "Mighty Midgets" or "Mighty Mice" and were noticeably elated as the locals responded by "putting-out" under adverse circumstances. If future opponents concentrate on Hayes, somebody else is going to have a glorious opportunity to roll in points, because nobody can make more than 5 baskets in action at once. The Lions hit 571 for the game, compared to Roseburg's very adequate 475.
