Consider Picture Frames In Refurbishing House

If you are refurbishing your rooms as an antidote to the mid-winter doldrums, don't overlook picture frames, suggests Mrs. W. E. Riley, Lane County extension agent.

"New pictures and new frames often can give an all-new personality to a dull room," she said. "Too often we cling to the same pictures year after year, when a fresh scene would provide a better accent."

To help you in your choice of picture frames and mats and in the actual techniques of framing pictures, an extension booklet, "Picture Frames" may be had by calling the Lane County Extension Service office at DF 5-8418.

Reupholster Chair As Winter Project

A winter project that will pay big dividends is the re-upholstering of a time-worn chair, according to Mrs. F. A. Klippstein, Lane county extension agent, in home economics.

"Any homemaker without either previous experience or professional assistance can successfully make new furniture out of old by following a few step-by-step directions in 'basic construction,'" Mrs. Klippstein said.

The methods given for replacing seat webbing, spring tying, making edge rolls, and other upholstery processes are time-proven ones used in the Oregon extension teaching program. They are presented in an attractively illustrated booklet, "Re-upholstering a Chair at Home." Copies are available from the Lane County Extension service.
