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BILL WOULD ADMIT 10,000 ORPHANS

A bill which would admit 10,000 orphans to the United States as permanent residents was submitted by Congressman Charles O. Porter Monday, January 28.

"Such legislation would reestablish, within the State Department, an orphan program quite similar to the provisions of the orphan section of the Refugee Relief Act," Porter said, adding that the bill would also increase the age of eligible orphans from 10 years as provided in the Refugee Act to 12.

In a statement for the Congressional Record, Porter paid special tribute to the work done by Harry Holt of Creswell, Oregon, for having "personally undertaken the Herculean task of bringing many Korean children to America."
