Rally Falls Short, Lions Lose 48-45

Cottage Grove dropped the second half of their two-day stand at North Bend Friday evening, despite a blazing 4th quarter rally which lost momentum at 43-44 with 2:31 left in the game. Grove's full-floor press, which has bothered opponents all year, was solved by the coast crew after a North Bend time-out, and the home club stalled out the balance of the contest, adding only 2 free throws by Bill Rust and a fielder by Dennis Smith, which was matched by a pair of foul tosses by Lion guard Ted Picknell. Both teams were cold in shooting percentage, with several missed lay-ins and short shots. The score was tied 10-10 after one period and 20-20 at halftime. The intermission lasted an extra 15 or 20 minutes because of a blown fuse.

In the crucial 3rd quarter North Bend pulled away from a 30-30 tie to a 36-30 end of the period, lead, and then added 5 more counters at the beginning of the final quarter before the Groves began to move. Altogether the drought for the Lions lasted 5:46 as the ball did everything but drop through the Groves. When Cottage Grove found the range again it brought them from 30-41 to 39-41 on 9 straight points and eventually to the aforementioned 43-44 before drying up. One aspect of the game which amazed players and spectators alike was the neglect on the part of the officials to call a single "3-second" violation in the frustrating final two minutes. Cottage Grove players encircled the Bulldogs with the ball repeatedly at close-checking range, sometimes for as long as 10 seconds, but the call was never made. The Lions now have finished half the league season with a 1-4 record and will be looking for a few more wins in the second round, starting this Friday night against league leading Eugene at Eugene and at home Saturday evening against Springfield.

OSC Picked to Add Flight Training To ROTC Work

OREGON STATE COLLEGE—The department of army has selected Oregon State college as one of only 40 colleges in the country to add flight training to its advanced army ROTC program.

Fourteen seniors in the army reserve officer training program have been selected to start the training which will qualify them for private pilot certificates before June graduation, according to Col. E. C. Knapp, commander of the college army ROTC unit.

OSC is the first college in the eight western states to begin the army flight program. Four others—University of Washington, Arizona State, Utah State and Santa Clara—are authorized to start this year.

The flight training program is being added by the army as part of its new emphasis on aviation training and as a means of stimulating interest among college men in army careers. Col. Knapp said.

It has the added advantage also of determining a student's qualification for flying before he actually begins the long and costly army flight program after graduation.

Earlier this year, the OSC air force ROTC unit was picked as one of the first institutions in the U.S. to introduce the flight instruction program into its training. Twenty-five seniors are enrolled in that program and some already have made their solo flights.

Flight training in college ROTC programs was authorized by the last Congress. Instruction includes some 35 hours of light plane flight training and 35 hours of ground school. The flying portion of the program is administered under the Civil Aeronautics administration.

There is no charge to the student. Army ROTC students who successfully complete the flight training program will continue training in army aviation after finishing a basic branch course of training. OSC offers army ROTC training in infantry, artillery, signal corps and engineers. It is one of only 35 colleges in the country that offers ROTC training in all branches—army, air force, navy and marine corps.

Chaplain of Alaska Guard Spins Tales Of Whale Hunting

PORT RICHARDSON, Alaska

—Possibly the only whale-hunting chaplain in U.S. military annals went through training here recently with the First Scout Platoon, Alaska National Guard.

Captain Percy Ipalook, former Presbyterian missionary who now works for the Bureau of Indian Affairs Native School in Kotzebue, can vividly recall whale hunts over the past four decades. Kotzebue is 180 miles north of Point Barrow, one of the principal whaling ports in Alaska and the chaplain's birthplace some 50-odd years ago.
