Rheumatic Fever To Get Attention Of OHA in 1957

Oregon Heart Assn. plans to expand its attack on rheumatic fever during 1957 to include preventive as well as educational and research activities, according to Dr. Herbert Griswold, association president and head of the cardiology division, University of Oregon medical school.

Dr. Griswold has advised H. G. (Bud) Horn, state chairman for the association's February Heart Fund campaign, that the 1957 budget calls for the expenditure of large sums to carry on the fight against rheumatic fever, often the forerunner of rheumatic heart.

Research projects already under way at the University of Oregon medical school, Reed college and at Bend (Oreg.) will continue, but in addition there will be a pilot study of rheumatic incidence in an area stretching from the Oregon coast to the mountains which is still in the planning stage and not yet ready to be announced.

Despite the fact that rheumatic fever is a leading cause of disability and death among children and young adults, it can now be listed as a preventable disease, Horn stated.

An Oregon Heart Assn. bulletin points out that rheumatic fever is almost invariably preceded by a streptococcal infection, most commonly a "strep" sore throat, and urges prompt medical attention of suspected "strep" infections.

W. M. Campbell of the county school superintendent's office met with the board Monday evening to help in making out the new budget. It will be voted on at the next regular school board meeting March 4.

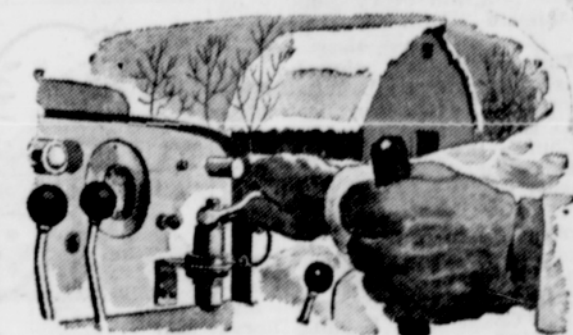
