Arthur S. King Listed Speaker At Eugene Feb. 21

A series of eight weekly meetings concerning flood control and Willamette river valley development, open to all valley residents, will begin with an all-day orientation conference in Eugene, Thursday, February 21, 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the Eugene hotel. The weekly series, under joint sponsorship of Oregon State college extension Division and General Extension Division, will start Monday evening, February 25. All sessions in the eight-week series are scheduled for Monday evenings, 7:30 to 9:30, in Commonwealth hall on the University of Oregon campus. No registration fees or charges of any kind are to be made for attendance.

Correspondence Work Credit Policy Explained by Department of Education

Questions concerning correspondence study and correspondence schools have been directed to the local high school from time to time. Such study is important to young people who, because of illness or some other reason, find it difficult to complete their high school education.

The February issue of Education News, published by the Oregon state department of education, explains the policy of granting credit for correspondence work. The bulletin emphasizes that "at present only work that is taken with the General Extension Division of the State System of Higher Education is approved."

Commercial correspondence schools are not members of any of the accrediting associations in Oregon; therefore, such schools cannot grant a diploma which will be recognized by Oregon colleges. "All correspondence work from the General Extension Division must be approved by the high school principal of the school granting the diploma," the bulletin further states, "if the work is to be applied toward fulfilling high school graduation requirements."

Often the plan to complete one's high school education by correspondence courses does not develop as one planned. The cost of one semester's work is \$20, making correspondence study expensive. Students also find quite often that studying without supervision is difficult, and lessons by correspondence are made up of lengthy written assignments.

For the student needing to take one or two courses to complete requirements for graduation correspondence work can be the answer. One should make arrangements for such study through the local high school, however, to make sure the credit thus earned is acceptable.
