## Axemen Top Lions 64-52 on Feb. 15

Eugene's No. 2 ranked Axemen overpowered Cottage Grove's Lions last Friday evening on the Eugene court, but not without a struggle, as Coach Donn Gassaway's charges made a game of it for three periods, finally bowing to the combined pressure of playing two almost equally good Eugene teams and the carrying of a total of 19 fouls into the final quarter. The final Axemen margin of 12 points consisted largely of better accuracy at the foul line, as they rolled in 26 counters on 22 Lion fouls, while Grove tallied only 16 on 19 Eugene infractions. Field goals favored the home forces by a slim 19-18 margin. The Axemen led at all quarters, 19-14, 31-26, 49-42, and the final 64-52, but Cottage Grove was pressing the league-leaders through much of the game, never

## Grove Improves Its Shooting, But Loses to Millers

Cottage Grove built up a better shooting percentage, 31.1 to 28.0, but lost to Springfield's Millers at the free-throw line, hitting Springfield hit 13-18 points, while Grove miscues last Saturday evening on the local court. Rebounding favored the visitors 50-44 including 22 for Miller center Wally Knecht. Hayes and Woodworth each grabbed off 15 for Grove.

In individual scoring Lion Leon Hayes continued to lead the scoring column with 23. Knecht hit 15 for Springfield, followed by Millers Rick Herman and Dave Saunders with 12. George Woodworth Jr. followed Hayes in local scoring with 9. Hayes now has 157 points in 7 league games for a 22 plus average. The Lion's pressing defense had Springfield confused in the second quarter, but the Millers began to hit outside in the third period and drew fouls when they worked the ball in closer. Springfield also won the JV game 41-30. Cottage Grove will host Roseburg tomorrow night and finish the season against Coos Bay and North Bend at home the following weekend.
