

'I'm in Love With Jesus' Is Theme Of Annual Formal Valentine Banquet

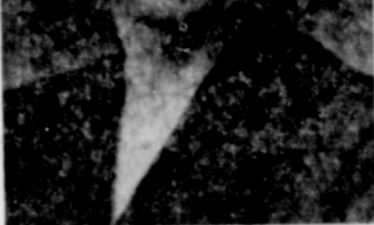

Variety Provided in Outdoor Enjoyment For Tourists As Well As Lane Residents

Lane county has provided a considerable variety of facilities for the outdoor enjoyment of the tourist as well as the people of the county itself, says a recent release by the Lane County Parks and Recreation commission. These opportunities and the facilities making them available are provided by several agencies, the report continues. The Lane County Parks and Recreation commission has provided additional facilities where they are needed when no other agency was willing or able to do so, or when there was a particular advantage in the county making the development.

County-provided facilities include 15 developed picnic areas, in most of which camping is allowed. Swimming is allowed in seven and there are fish to be caught in 19 of the developed areas. There are 11 launching ramps, one of which is equipped with a takeout launch.

Three major parks, on U. S. Army Corps of Engineers reservoirs have been developed in the Cottage Grove area, including Baker Bay Recreation area on Dorena reservoir, east of Cottage Grove. Here are free picnic facilities for families and groups. There is a free launching ramp and ample parking area. Swimming is allowed. 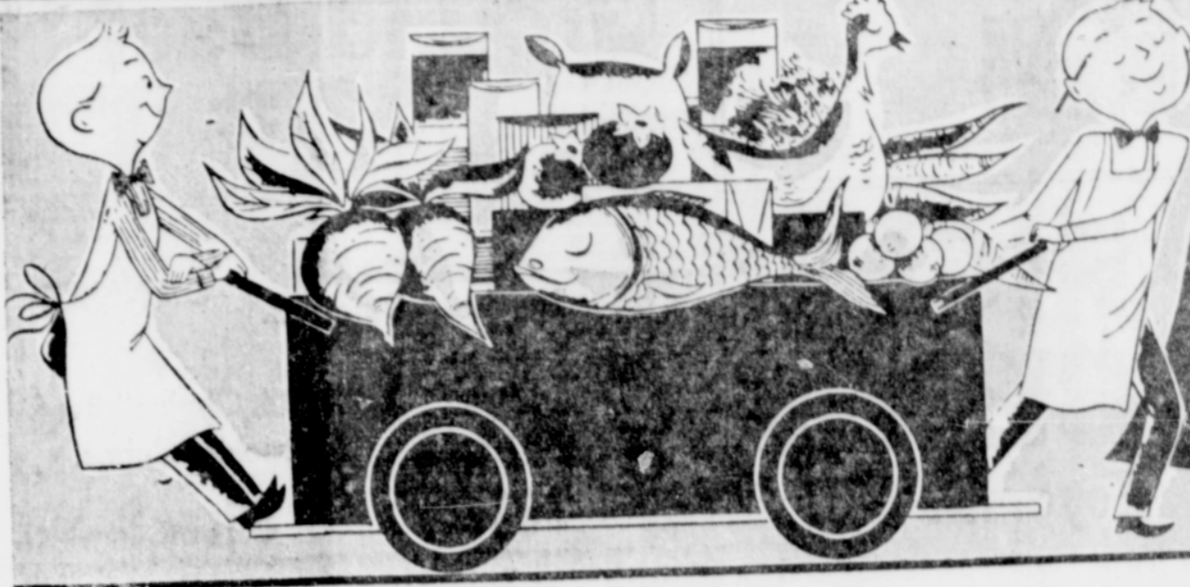
Picnickers, campers and bank fishermen find Vaughn and Baker Stewart parks at the upper end of Dorena reservoir interesting and at Harms park, an excellent camp and parking area. Boats may be tied up for short periods of time at the moorage float. Also near Cottage Grove, Blue Mountain park on Mosby Creek has a fine campground and picnic area with a sizeable shelter. The stream provides good fishing in the spring and a trail leads along the creek. A large portion of this park, away from the stream, is set up as a timber harvest demonstration tract under the guidance of OSC extension department. Timber management practices and principles are here demonstrated for educational purposes.

Similar facilities are provided on Dexter and Lookout Point reservoirs on the Willamette, on the McKenzie and farther down on the Willamette at the Ferry Street Bridge park, Eugene, and Brown's public landing near Junction City, as well as many public facilities on the Siuslaw and in the coastal area in western Lane county. A bridge trail is being developed to connect a city park on the south of Eugene to the wild Spencer Butte park, making possible a spectacular ride in that city's immediate vicinity.

Lee Murphy of Junction City is chairman of the commission and Herman Head, Springfield, secretary. Other members are A. F. Richards, vice chairman, Dan P. Allen, Mrs. Max Burris, Roy A. Elliott, and Karl Onthank, all of Eugene; William H. Cash of Oakridge, Carl Baker of Vida, Earl H. Hill of Cushman, and Miles O. Wicks of Cottage Grove. Gene Renard is superintendent of the Lane County Parks and Recreation commission.

Is your family caught with its bank account down? Most families object to leftovers, I know. But using those last bits of roast meat, cooked vegetables and cake can make a big difference in the food budget.

Instead of having "leftover" night blues, try some of these tricks—

... toast leftover cake squares or cookies in a moderate oven (350°F.) 5-10 minutes. Crumble and sprinkle on ice cream as a dessert topping.

... Combine 2 cups seasoned leftover mashed potatoes with 1 egg and ¼ cup chopped onion. Dip in flour and pan fry lightly in hot fat.

... Use leftover cooked vegetables in salads, or combine 2 cups of cooked vegetables with 1 cup of Carnation Cream Sauce* in casserole. Top with buttered crumbs and bake 15-20 minutes in moderate oven (350°F.).

REFLECTIONS

George Washington

Early in life George Washington acquired the magic of method. During the long and trying period his early acquisition of methodical planning helped bring order out of chaos. As a farmer he followed a plan, as Commander in Chief he followed a plan, as President he followed a well thought out plan, bringing a "disunited, war-weary, young Republic to a quiet, orderly state of peace."

Washington, as a boy, stood aloof from the rowdy crowd of boys and acquired the distinction of being "aloof." He was the most sociable person one could meet—with neighbors and friends. In 1794 the Englishman Charles James told British Parliament: "No breath of censure has ever impeached the purity of his conduct, no envy ever maligned his virtue. He was a man of transcendent merit."

Declining a military guard for his inauguration he said, "I require no guard but the affection of the people." Make your affection felt for this unusual man, Friday, February 22nd. Honor his memory.

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
