Improvements were made in the clubhouse Friday, making better voting facilities. Recently members had purchased plywood for the improvements.

The London 4-H Mothers club was organized January 29, 1941. At first members started crafts and studied the different projects included in the 4-H clubs. In 1948 they commenced making the quilts.

The club met at first in the homes of the members and then in the old Woodard cookhouse. They met for awhile in the old Black Butte school house and the Calapooia hotel. In 1944 members purchased the London club house, which was later sold to Dean Martin and is now used for London Grange meetings.

In 1951 W. A. Woodard donated a building to the club and A. L. Woodard moved it for them, locating it on the Leon Morton property. This is their present meeting house and it also is used for voting and other community activities.

London 4-H Mothers club started the hot lunch program at London school; at first, members took turns cooking at the school. For a number of years they canned fruit and vegetables for the lunches.

Club members kept busy during the war with Red Cross sewing. They have made many scrapbooks for children's hospitals besides working on other projects.
