Honey Crisp Coffee Cake

1 recipe Quick Coffee Cake batter
3 tablespoons melted butter
1/4 cup honey
1/4 cup shredded coconut
1/4 cup corn flakes
1/4 cup drained, crushed pineapple
Cream together butter and honey until light and fluffy. Add coconut, crushed corn flakes and pineapple and mix thoroughly. Spread over quick coffee cake batter before baking.

Jam Streusel Coffee Cake

1 recipe Quick Coffee Cake
2 tablespoons butter
1/4 cup sugar
1/4 cup enriched flour
1/4 cup jam
Combine butter, sugar and flour. Mix until crumbly. Sprinkle over quick coffee cake batter to form squares. Fill squares with jam and bake.

Poached Eggs on Parmesan Toast

1 tablespoon soft butter
3 slices enriched toast
1 tablespoon finely grated Parmesan cheese
3 poached eggs
Spread 1 teaspoon butter on each slice of toast. Sprinkle 1 teaspoon Parmesan cheese on each slice of butter toast. Top each slice of Parmesan toast with a poached egg. Serve immediately.
Yield: 3 servings.

Cover Lampshade Yourself to Give Custom-made Look

Don't toss out that dingy lampshade. Recover it yourself for that home exterior "custom planned" look, suggests Mrs. W. E. Riley, Lane County extension agent in home economics.

"With a fresh and original covering, a lampshade can begin its life anew," she said. "Making a fabric lampshade is often less time-consuming than searching for a shade to fit a lamp."

Copies of "Making Fabric Lampshades" may be had from the Lane County Extension Service office, 1170 Pearl street, by calling DL 5-8418.

Fabrics that neither stretch or fray badly are most suitable for lamp shade covering and lining. Mrs. Riley explained. Colors should be chosen which are pleasing whether the lamp is lighted or unlighted.

"Effect of a shade is entirely dependent on choice of fabric," Mrs. Riley said. "A shade covered with dotted swiss, dimity, or organdy is in character with a young girl's room. Shades of butcher's linen and lightweight drapery material are suitable for living room or dens. And, gingham-covered shades are in keeping with decor of the ranchstyle home."
