Navy Taking Enlistments For Nuclear Training

The navy is now accepting a limited number of applications for enlistment and training in the nuclear field, both surface and submarine, Chief Engineerman Lee Jeans, navy recruiter in Eugene, has announced.

To qualify for nuclear training a young man must be a high school graduate and meet certain physical requirements, such as normal color perception and pass a qualification test. The majority enlisted under this program will be assigned to submarine duty and will be required to volunteer for submarine duty and meet submarine physical requirements.

not only between the state and the school districts, but also between the less wealthy, and the more wealthy districts.

A few of the many reasons for supporting the School District Reorganization Bill, the Congress says, are that school laws will be simplified because there will not be so many types of districts, a local district actually has more resources to support its educational program from grades 1-12, studies from all over the U. S. prove conclusively that the best educational program is available only when all grades from 1 through 12 are administered under one school system, and that the large operating cost of educating children in many small districts can be reduced.

Appropriation of \$7,000,000 from State General Fund to establish a School Construction Fund is asked in a bill relating to school building construction aid. Should this bill be passed the districts could obtain aid by qualifying as "distressed" districts and by satisfying other steps outlined. Classroom, sanitary facilities and heating plants would have priority. This is one of the four most important ones in the list of eight, Mr. Fasold said.

Because the development of recreation facilities and programs is thought to be of tremendous value to children and youth, the Congress supports a bill to Create an Oregon Board of Recreation to provide leadership and guidance in the field of recreation, considering both tourist and local needs.

The amendment to the Rural School District law would annex all school districts in the county rural school district and would be a means of equalizing the tax burden of local districts. If the basic fund is increased and distribution is based on need, further equalization may not be necessary at this time. One feature of this bill is that the office of county school superintendent be appointive rather than elective.

The Home Safety amendment would establish a home safety program within the state board of health.
