State Hiway Dept. To Receive Bids On 31 Projects

SALEM—At its next regular meeting in Portland on February 28 and March 1, the Oregon State Highway commission will receive bids on 31 highway, bridge, park and signalization projects costing an estimated \$3,800,000.

The 31 projects include approximately 28.07 miles of grading, 22.25 miles of stone base and shoulders, 63.22 miles of oiling, 2.94 miles of asphaltic concrete pavement, 7 bridges, 24,200 linear feet of guard rail, 6640 rods of fencing, 2 signalized intersections, 1 overnight camp extension, channel widening to form a boat basin, 1.02 miles of asphaltic concrete pavement, and approximately 54,500 cubic yards of crushed maintenance rock in stockpiles.

Included in the 31 projects are two in Douglas county. One project calls for slope stabilization work on 0.33 mile at the relocated Pacific highway on the summit of Roberts mountain about 8 miles south of Roseburg. The work entails the cutting back of existing slopes which are raveling and sliding to prevent danger of their sliding into the roadway.

The second project involves the construction of a new bridge over the South Umpqua river on the Riddle County road. The proposed new bridge will be built at the site of the existing Pruner Bridge, approximately two miles north of Riddle.

Four projects are included in Lane county.

One project calls for the installation of approximately 3,100 linear feet of metal guard rail of latest design on three sections of the Willamette highway and two sections of the McKenzie highway, east and southeast of Eugene. This work is being performed in the highway safety and is scheduled to be completed by the end of July, 1957.

Another project involves construction of a 335-foot reinforced concrete bridge over Mohawk river, about 5 miles northeast of Springfield on the Eugene-Marcola highway.

There are two park improvement projects to be considered at this commission meeting for Lane county. One project calls for the expansion of the overnight camping area at Honeyman State Park about 4 miles south of Florence.

The other park project involves construction of additional park facilities in Jesse M. Honeyman State Park about five miles south of Florence in Lane county. The improvements will consist of a utility building and 33 campsites to be located just south of the existing camping area west of the Oregon Coast highway. It is estimated that work on this project will be completed by the end of June, 1957.
