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Church of Nazarene Reports Past Year Is Outstanding

Church of the Nazarene, a relatively small denomination, had one of the most outstanding years in its 54-year history in 1962 according to Dr. S. T. Ludwig, Kansas City, Mo., general church secretary.

And the local Church of the Nazarene at 152 South M St., has also made good gains this year. Pastor Arlie B. Conner reports. The congregation finished and moved into its new church building early in the year and a dedication service was held in October with a large crowd from Cottage Grove and surrounding area in attendance.

The church has shown good increases in both membership and Sunday school, according to the Rev. Mr. Conner, and the Sunday school won an attendance banner the last four months. The banner is given to the church with the largest increase in Sunday school attendance in competition with Sunday schools of comparable size in Western Oregon.

The world mission program of the denomination opened work in Chile and Bermuda, and the first Nazarene church in the Republic

of Panama was organized according to a report by the Information Service. The Nazarenes now have work in 43 countries the report states.

Also abroad the Nazarenes organized a new church district in West Germany with five congregations and dedicated a sanctuary in Frankfurt and a church in Copenhagen, Denmark. Also opened, the report continues, was a church at Nazareth, Israel, the first Protestant church to be built in Israel since the nation was reestablished in 1948, and a new church at Brasilia, the first Protestant church to be dedicated in the new inland capital of Brazil. The denomination's radio program carries a Spanish language broadcast and an English program.

The annual statistical report by Dr. Ludwig showed a 2.49 percent gain in domestic membership; a net gain of 28 new churches; a denominational record set in per capita giving; a record total for giving for all purposes and gains in the Sunday school, Foreign Missionary Society, Vacation Bible school and Young People's Society.

SDA Missions Appeal Exceeds Goal

Pastor Elmer Unterseher, local director of the Seventh-day Adventist church missions appeal just concluded, this week issued a statement of thanks to citizens of Cottage Grove. Mr. Unterseher said that "the people of Cottage Grove have demonstrated their regard for the less fortunate."

This campaign has been conducted since 1963 with all unpaid solicitors consisting of church members who contribute their time. Even the children take part with their door to door canvassing. None of the funds are used for administrative expense.

The funds are divided between local needs such as welfare and disaster relief, and world needs such as clinic, dispensaries, leper colonies, mission schools—often the only facilities available to large populations. It is a world appeal. Funds from this appeal totaled approximately 5 percent of the \$99,902.355 given by members last year.

The goal for Cottage Grove was \$1,100 this year and thanks to the generosity of the people of Cottage Grove the church went over its goal, Mr. Unterseher said.
