Defending A-2 Kings Nip Lions

Defending state A-2 champions Pleasant Hill had its hands full here Friday night as the Billies nipped an inexperienced but scrappy Cottage Grove crew 54-53.

Almost half of the Billies points came from 5-10 Mike Hill, a dead-eye who bagged 25 points, high for both teams.

While Hill was the offensive show for the A-2 champs, four Lions shared the bulk of the Cottage Grove scoring attack. Charlie Olds, with 17 points, led the way, followed by Gary Vogler's 13, and 10 points apiece from Mark Henningsgaard and Merle Carpenter.

The first quarter, ending 12-12, set the tempo for the see-saw affair. Olds picked up 8 of the Lions points in the first stanza. Cottage Grove pulled into a 24-22 halftime lead as Carpenter, Vogler and Henningsgaard caught fire on a series of field goals and free throws.

Hill, who was 5 for 5 from the charity line, popped in two shots from the floor after connecting on four free throws to pace the Billies in the third quarter, ending in a 37-37 deadlock. Vogler picked up 6 of his 13 points in this period of play.

Too Much Hill
The last quarter proved to be too much Hill and too many one-pointers. Hill dumped in 6 points and Bruce Bradshaw 9, five of these from the free-throw mark. Olds scored 8 points in the last minutes of play and Henningsgaard hit from the field to cut the margin to one point before time ran out.

The Lions dominated scoring from the field, but the Billies more than made up the difference in free throws with 16 completed to the Lions' 7. In field goals it was Cottage Grove with 23, the Billies, 19.

This Friday at 2 p.m. Cottage Grove again meets Sweet Home, a team they whipped away from home. This time they meet in the Lions' lair.

League play opens Friday, January 11 with Cottage Grove hosting South Eugene in an 8 p.m. contest.

No Banner Year for State's Hunters

1962 Favored Anglers

A brand new year lies ahead for Oregon's hunters and fishermen. And if the coming year provides the success and enjoyment of the one just past, we can all look forward with optimism to a year of great hunting and fishing.

In retrospect, we can look back on old 1962 as a good one for devotees of rod and gun. Old man 1962 did not produce a banner year from a hunting standpoint but Oregon anglers found him generous, producing top quality fishing with the best.

From all corners of the state, reports indicate anglers had one of their better years. Some of the high lights include almost fabulous fishing at the popular East and Paulina lakes, Prineville reservoir, a new impoundment coming into its own, produced fish in excellent numbers. So did Bull Prairie lake, a new impoundment built by the game commission south of Heppner, and Morgan lake out of La Grande.

Howard Prairie Good
Another fine producer of trout last summer was Howard Prairie in the Medford country. Squaw lakes, Fish lake, and Willow Creek reservoir in southwest Oregon all proved productive last season. Diamond Lake anglers were somewhat disappointed with this famed body of water until late season when it suddenly came alive and produced trout in excellent numbers.

Fish lake in the Steens provided exciting angling, and there was no letup in the almost fantastic numbers of fish that came out of the majestic Willowa mountain country. The pack-in lakes along the Cascade crest yielded many tasty fish dinners, and the lake basin of central Oregon was as productive as ever. Salmon anglers enjoyed a good season in most waters of the state.

state. Undoubtedly the big Columbia was the top producer, but excellent reports were received from most popular salmon angling areas. Willamette spring chinook anglers had a somewhat disappointing season, the result of a low run of springers which moved up the river.

Steelhead Season a Success
The steelhead season, too, was a good one, with several rivers producing top numbers of the big sea-going rainbow trout. The Rogue was reported excellent for summer steelhead, and the Deschutes fair. Winter steelhead reports good success from most of the coastal streams.

We lost ground in several impoundments last summer, including McKay, Malheur and Haystack. The first two were drawn down to sump level for irrigation purposes and the latter drawn down for repairs. All of these should be back in fishery production next summer.

Another loss was Mann lake on the east side of the Steens, fabulous producer of cutthroat trout, which failed to fill with the spring runoff. Many large cutthroats were saved through salvage operations by the game commission, but losses were heavy as water evaporated and became too warm to sustain fish life.

Dam Bursts
A serious loss occurred when the Meadow Lake dam at the head of the Nestucca burst sending a wall of water filled with logs debris, and lake-bottom mud roaring down this popular salmon and steelhead stream. The true extent of damage is not known, but investigations showed practically all fish in the main stem were killed by the flood or left stranded in fields away from the river. It was also estimated that much of the salmon spawn was lost by scouring action of the flood and silt deposition.

On the credit side, a few of the more important contributions to the fishery by the game commission include several new impoundments completed, extensive stream rehabilitation on the Siskiyou, Rogue and other coast streams, comprehensive water flow studies on a number of streams, and some giant strides made in research on salmon and steelhead. Alsea and Wilson river steelhead anglers are already reaping the rewards from the research studies. Benefiting anglers also are a number of new access sites developed, rehabilitation of several bodies of water, and the final step in bringing Davis lake into fishery production for next summer.

No Bumper Crops

Although the 1962 hunting season probably did not produce bumper crops of game, it was undoubtedly a good one for most species. Final figures on total harvest will not be available until about March, but from reports most hunters had good hunting and an enjoyable season.

Upland game birds were found in good numbers, including top quality quail hunting which was surprising following a disastrous winter on the carry-over of breeding stocks. But the nesting season was good and quail hunters found ample numbers of birds to bang away at last fall. Chukar populations were high in the rimbok and cheat grass hills and mountain quail were also found in good numbers. Pheasants were readily available in most of the popular gunning areas.

From all reports the waterfowl season was only fair. Usually productive Sammam Lake and Warner Valley proved stung. Bluebird weather was credited as the major reason for the poor shooting. Snow geese were available in good numbers, but flew well out of range of the hunters' guns. Some good shooting occurred around Ontario. Sauvie Island gunners found fair to good waterfowl hunting almost throughout the season. The Klamath country was considered poor.

Big Game Hunting

Big game hunters did fair to good, although the Columbus day storm raised havoc with deer hunting and steelhead streams. Better deer hunting areas. Even so, reports indicate the deer season was a pretty good one in most areas of the state. Late season checks during three controlled deer hunts showed that 44 percent of the hunters participating in one of the hunts had killed a deer during the general season while over 60 percent of the hunters participating in the other two controlled hunts had taken a deer during the general season.

The elk hunt was reported as being a good one, and will probably tally out on a par with other seasons of the past. Fine elk hunting reports came in throughout the elk ranges this year. A high percentage of cow elk taken in the Cheshinnum country during the either-sex hunt were found to be pregnant, indicating excellent reproduction taking place. Hunters had previously been reporting that there were no bulls to be found in the Cheshinnum herd.

Regression on Ranges

From the big game production standpoint, a number of winter ranges in eastern Oregon showed regression and will undoubtedly be unable to winter satisfactorily the numbers of deer they did in the past. In addition, a complete winter range for deer along the Sprague river in Klamath county will soon no longer be in existence, the result of subdivision and development into home sites.

Again on the credit side, the game commission conducted extensive rehabilitation on a number of big game ranges, with some work done cooperatively with other land agencies. A number of water holes were developed for big game, and wildlife food plantings continued on the Troy and White River big game ranges.

Range Acquired

Acquisition of the Bridge Creek Flats on the John Day was completed.

Smith Scores 1962's Final Hole-in-One
