Deposits Doubled in CG

U. S. National Notes Business Increase

U. S. National Bank continues to exceed the \$1 billion mark in total resources, according to the year-end figures released this week.

Deposits were up more than \$76 million and now total \$983,473,352 compared with \$906,711,716 recorded on December 30, 1961. Loans increased nearly \$77 million and now stand at \$504,017,359 compared with \$427,073,452 recorded one year ago.

The Cottage Grove Branch of the U. S. National recorded total deposits of \$4,254,730.34 compared with \$2,141,543.17 on December 30, 1961, according to Charles E. Hart, manager. Loans and discounts for the local branch totaled \$1,955,933.34 compared to \$964,816.28 recorded on December 30, 1961.

Total resources for the U. S. National system, with its 85 banking offices throughout the state, were \$1,079,346,587 compared with \$1,002,086,875 on December 30, 1961. The total resources figures is up more than \$77 million over last year's total.

During 1962 U. S. National opened branches in Gladstone,

Seaside, Burlingame (Portland) and Stayton, and completed a new building for the existing branch in north Medford.

Six additional new branches are currently in the planning or construction stage, two of which are in Portland — a north Portland branch on North Interstate at Going street, and another to be located in the urban renewal district. Other new branches are scheduled in Eugene, Prineville, Lakeview and Salem.

New buildings are scheduled for present branches in Bend, Madras, Stayton, The Dalles, West Salem and Milwaukie-Powell and Burlingame branches in Portland.

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Suggestions Made For Survival Pantry

Your grocery list for a two-week's camping trip is every bit as adaptable to the emergency food shelf as it is to the camp box, says Miss Virginia Houtchens, Lane extension agent in home economics.

Foods that stave off hunger pangs in the wilds will also do the best job of keeping the family well nourished in the event of disaster.

And the homemaker who's setting up a "survival pantry" should copy the camper in demanding foods that are easy to store, keep without refrigeration and require little or no cooking. By planning the "survival pantry" around the family's likes, thinking in terms of "one meal menus", and taking into consideration family size, "meal planning in a disaster need not be disastrous," Miss Houtchens emphasizes.

Foods canned in metal or glass will retain their qualities for six months to a year, when stored in a dry place at a temperature of no more than 70 degrees F. Dry foods — crackers, cereal, cookies, potato chips and dry milk — will remain palatable for several months. Sugar, salt, hard candy will keep indefinitely. And dried fruits — if kept dry — will hold for one or two years.

To keep a fresh supply of packaged foods on the emergency shelf, Miss Houtchens suggests a system of rotation. A convenience-measure, she adds, is to repack economy-size packages of dried foods in family-size provisions. Canned goods purchased in a size just big enough for a family will avoid the waste of left-overs.

Many foods deteriorate rapidly once the container is opened, unless refrigerated, she explained. Foods that are highly perishable are meat, poultry, fish, vegetables, fruit and evaporated milk.

What specifically should the "disaster pantry" include? Miss Houtchens suggests the following:

* **DRY MILK:** This is a "must" she emphasizes. If you buy dry milk in the bulk, repack it in smaller containers and store in a tightly closed can.

* **EVAPORATED MILK:** Store in a cool place, turn cans over every 30 days to avoid fat separation. A dark color develops over long-time storage.

* **CANNED FRUIT:** Add the selections your family enjoys — and in amounts that can be eaten at one meal. Bland and easy to digest, pears are an excellent choice.

* **SOUPS:** Allow at least one can per day for each member of the family, bouillon cubes are a quick source of nourishment.

* **CEREALS:** Plan on one package daily for the family. And if you'd save on dishes, buy the

smaller packages that form their own bowl.

* **BREAD:** Yeast bread is a poor keeper — but Boston Brown bread and crackers are long lasting and filling.

* **COOKIES, CRACKERS:** A welcome addition to every pantry. But do work out a system so the supply is restocked every month.

* **JUICE:** Choose juices high in vitamin C — orange, grapefruit, and tomato. Juices canned with very little sugar or salt are most effective as thirst quenchers. Cool storage is necessary.

* **VEGETABLES:** Store an assortment in "meal-size" cans. Dry potatoes and potato chips are also suggested. Investigate dehydrated vegetables.

* **MEATS:** Canned meat with little salt in sizes "just right" for a family meal. Refrigeration is unlikely in a disaster — so don't plan on left-overs.

* **CHEESE:** Buy it canned, in glass jars, or foil wrapped. Cheese products should be rotated so the oldest are used first.

* **PEANUT BUTTER, HONEY, JELLY:** Work out a rotation system for these, too.

* **TREATS:** Hard candy, pickles, gum, dried fruit, nuts are "musts" in every disaster pantry.
