Lions Hang 56-31 Loss On Huskies

Cottage Grove held Sweet Home to eight first-half points, only two in the second quarter, to hand the visiting Huskies a 56-31 shellacking Friday afternoon.

The Lions, who connected on almost half of their shots, raced off to a 12-0 lead before the Huskies could score. And things didn't get much better for the visitors later in the game.

Nine Lions scored with Charlie Olds 10 points leading the way. Close behind in a well-balanced scoring attack were Mark Henningsgaard and Gary Vogler, 9 points apiece, Merle Carpenter, 8, Jim Dockery and Lou Bonzon with 6 each.

Halftime score showed the locals far ahead 23-8, and going into the final quarter the lead had stretched to 40-20.

Earlier in the season, Cottage Grove traveled to Sweet Home where they buried the Huskies under a 44-29 count.

League play gets underway this Friday night with the Lions entertaining South Eugene. JV action starts at 6:15 with varsity play following at 8 p.m.

Saturday night the Lions travel to Willamette.

Annual Survey to Start

How Was Your Hunting Year?

Twenty thousand hunters will begin shortly to assist the game commission in its annual survey to determine how many big game animals, game birds and waterfowl were taken during the 1962 season.

The 20,000 nimrods selected at random from more than 250,000 licensed hunters will be asked to give their individual reports on success or failure last year.

Last week the game commission began to send hunter questionnaires to this select group. All hunters in the random sample should receive their questionnaires within a week or two. Recipients are requested to answer all questions and to report accurately their success as well as failures during last year's hunt. The questionnaires must then be returned to the game commission for statistical analysis.

Recipients who fail to return the questionnaire within the time limit allotted will be contacted in person by game commission personnel.

Information from the questionnaire is used to compute the total game kill by hunters during the year. This includes the deer kill, elk kill, the take of upland game birds by all species, and for all species of waterfowl.

Statistics report that information obtained from this random sampling of hunters — around 8 percent of the total — is extremely accurate. For deer, the accuracy of the total kill is slightly less than 1 percent. In other words, if a total deer kill of 100,000 animals is computed from information on the questionnaires, the actual kill may be anywhere between 99,000 and 101,000 animals. The accuracy of the

elk kill and that for upland game birds and waterfowl is also close to the 1 percent margin of error figure.

Total game kill figures for the 1962 season will be available the latter part of February or early March.

It's time again to remind salmon and steelhead anglers to return to the game commission their expired 1962 salmon and steelhead punch cards. Outlets for fishing and hunting licenses have been provided boxes in which the cards may be placed. The expired punch cards may also be mailed directly to the game commission, 1634 S. W. Alder, in Portland.

Salmon, Steelhead Catch
Information on the punch cards is used to compute the total catch of salmon and steelhead for last year, as well as determining the catch distribution by stream. The law requires that the punch cards be returned regardless of whether or not the holder fished or caught salmon or steelhead during the year.

So dig down in your wallet and get that punch card back to the game commission as soon as possible. You'll be doing your bit toward the future of salmon and steelhead angling.

And while we're about it, another reminder to steelheaders is to be on the lookout for marked fish this winter. Anglers are requested to report any marked fish taken to the Oregon game commission. Also, Wilson and Sandy river steelheaders should be especially alert, since these streams are undergoing special study.

Anglers will recognize marked fish since one or more of the fins will be missing. If you catch

one of these fish, record where the fish was caught, what day, and the approximate size and weight of the fish. Reports may be forwarded to game commission's Portland headquarters, regional offices, or to any commission personnel. Information gathered from such studies is invaluable in evaluating the contribution of hatcheries to the various stream systems.

It's important for anglers to correctly name the missing fins. A fin clipping code is involved which enables biologists to tell the year and in what waters the fish was originally released. If you're a little shaky on your fin naming, the paired fins along the belly include the pectorals near the gill cover, and the pelvic fins about half way astern. The single fin near the tail along the belly is called the anal fin. Along the top side we have the dorsal fin and the small fleshy appendage near the tail is called the adipose fin. To determine right and left sides just set the fish upright as he would be in the water and head him in the direction he swims.

Some 'Fishing' Hole'
We don't know whether to call this lake a pothole or not, but compared to many of the popular angling lakes, Morgan lake near La Grande can be considered small. Yet this 65-acre lake, last year probably far outstripped lakes which anglers normally believe to be the big trout producers.

Reclaimed several years ago from a conglomeration of trash and small warm-water game fish Morgan lake has become the pride of eastern Oregon. The 1962 creel check revealed that anglers reaped a harvest of 35,945 trout from this productive wa-

Bulldogs Topped From Undefeated Ranks by Billies

Pleasant Hill, the defending A-2 champion, toppled Creswell from the unbeaten ranks Friday night by whipping the Bulldogs 81-56 in Emerald League play at Creswell.

Bruce Bradshaw, with 23 points and Mike Hill, scoring 21, accounted for more than half of the Billies total points.

ter, and many of the trout were running large size. This is a harvest of approximately 599 trout or 150 pounds of trout per surface acre. Compare this to East lake, a great trout producer, which has never exceeded 67 pounds of trout per surface acre. Popular Paulina lake does well to exceed 25 pounds per acre.

Growth of trout at Morgan lake is rapid and the fish are deep bodied. The game commission stocks only fingerlings here, yet 72 percent of the fish taken last year were in the one and two-year age classes. Illustrating the rapid growth which takes place, the total number of fingerlings stocked in 1961 weighed 704 pounds, or about 11 pounds of trout per surface acre. Last year 1,192 pounds of fingerlings were stocked, or an average of 18 pounds per surface acre. And from 11 or 18 pounds per surface acre stocked to 150 pounds per surface acre produced is a lot of trout even in the best of piscatorial circles.
