FEMALE GERMAN ALIENS REQUIRED TO REGISTER

By proclamation of the president of the United States, German alien females 14 years of age and over will be required to register in accordance with the general rules and regulations prescribed by the attorney general of the United States.

The time set for the registration is from 6 a. m. Monday, June 17, continuing on each day successively thereafter, except Sunday, June 23, 1918, between the hours of 9 a. m. and 8 p. m., up to and including Wednesday, June 26, at 8 p. m.

In this community the postmistress will act as registration officer. Persons required to register should understand that by so doing they are giving proof of their peaceful dispositions and their intention to conform to the laws of the United States.

Each registrant is required to furnish four unmounted photographs of herself, not larger than 3½ inches in size, on thin paper, with light background. The photographs shall be of the shoulders and full face, without hat or head covering. All four photographs should be signed by registrant across the face of the photographs so as not to obliterate the features.

WORK AT COTTAGE GROVE MFG. CO. IS PROGRESSING

The work of remodeling the Cottage Grove Manufacturing company's plant is now moving rapidly. The regular work has been stopped until machinery can be moved and set up. Machinery which C. A. Stevens, the new partner in the business, brought with him from Oakland, is also being put into place.

Work is well under way for the boiler room, which will be located some distance north and east of the main building. The refuse from the saws and planers will be taken to the boilers by a carrier and blower system.

CODLING MOTH APPEAR; APPLY SPRAY AT ONCE

County Fruit Inspector Stewart reports that the first codling moth appeared on June 4 and some more on June 5, two weeks earlier than ever before known in this section. He says all trees should be sprayed before next Monday with the lime-sulphur solution, one gallon to 50 or 60 of water, plus one pound of dry arsenate of lead to each 50 gallons of water. The inspector anticipates that three sprayings will be necessary.

RED CROSS RECEIPTS ARE SHORT OF QUOTA SET

Amount Raised for the National Work Is \$500 Above the Sum Asked

The total receipts in the late Red Cross drive were \$4264.76, just a trifle short of the quota set, which was \$4500. The total raised for the national work was, however, above the quota asked, \$1250. The amount raised was \$1869.71. The total asked for local work was \$3150. The amount raised was \$2395.05. Twenty-five per cent of that raised for the national work will be returned to the local branch, bringing the total for the year's local work to \$2802.48.

A remarkable feature of the drive was the fact that all except \$980.05 was paid in cash.

Dr. and Mrs. C. B. King celebrated their fiftieth wedding anniversary Friday. Their own home being small, they invited their old-time friends to the McCargor home, where Mrs. McCargor assisted with the entertaining and serving, the afternoon being spent on the spacious lawn.

Dr. and Mrs. C. B. King were married May 31, 1868, Shelbyville, Tenn. They have been residents of Cottage Grove for 22 years, and both are 71 years of age. Their son Carl, who is with the army at Camp Lewis, was here for the anniversary. Their other son, John, of St. Louis, sent them a \$100 liberty bond as an anniversary present. Dr. and Mrs. King again went through the wedding ceremony which united them 50 years ago, the second ceremony being performed by Rev. Joseph Knotts, pastor of the Methodist church.

Dr. King is a Civil war veteran.

NEW WORLD LIFE ADOPTS NEW LIBERTY LOAN PLAN

Portland, Ore., June 5.—In making its subscription of \$50,000 to the third liberty loan, New World Life Insurance company recently adopted a plan of apportionment which bids fair to become very popular among the larger financial institutions.

"Our two former subscriptions," stated President Cadigan, "were each made in a lump sum through the home organization. We have felt, however, that we were in duty bound to remember the localities from which a considerable portion of our income is derived. For this reason we divided our last \$50,000 subscription between our general agents in various Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana centers. They in turn have placed the fund in the hands of their local committees.

"We hope to see other large local financial institutions adopt this plan, because it lends encouragement to the loyal people in the smaller towns from which Portland derives its standing as a financial and distributing center."

NO WHITE FLOUR IN LANE UNTIL NEXT HARVEST

Bakeries and Logging Camps Are Only Exceptions to the Wheatless Rule

No more wheat flour will be sold by Lane county grocers and provisioners until after harvest, according to action taken in Eugene Friday night at a meeting called by A. C. Dixon, county food administrator. The only exception will be to bakeries, logging camps and hospitals.

Some objections were made to the exception to the bakeries and logging camps being given privileges not accorded the private housewife but, nevertheless, the action was taken in accord with the request of the state food administration.

Regarding the permitting of logging camps and bakeries the privilege of flour on a 50-50 basis, two reasons were advanced. One was that they had to make bread that could be kept for several days, which was not feasible with out part wheat, while the housewife can make hot bread and baking powder bread and biscuits. Another reason given was that the housewife can buy some baker's bread and also can use much other cereals in the form of breakfast foods, etc. Logging camps and mills, it was also pointed out, were a part of the war machinery of the nation, and it was necessary to feed the men will, or they would not work.

Emphasis was also laid upon the fact that rye flour, while it cannot be sold as a substitute, can be sold without an accompanying substitute. Also that there were wheat breakfast foods that should be bought and used until the stocks now on hand are cleaned up, to save waste.

Mr. Dixon stated that there are now United States secret service men at work in Lane county, and that parties hoarding wheat or wheat flour or sugar will be punished. He also reported that several hoarders had already come in voluntarily and returned their surplus.

NUMBER OF CHANGES IN S. P. TRAIN SCHEDULE

A number of minor changes in time on Southern Pacific trains and the removal of the Shasta limited train from the time table, went into effect June 1. Of the north bound trains, No. 18 now arrives at 9:47 a. m. instead of 9:50; No. 14 arrives at 4:07 p. m. instead of 4:35; No. 16 at 3:29 a. m. instead of 2:33. Of the south bound trains, No. 13 arrives at 12:42 a. m. instead of 2:05; No. 53 arrives at 7:14 a. m. instead of 6:54; and No. 15 arrives at 2:47 p. m. instead of 2:42. There is no change in No. 17, its time still being 7:40 p. m.

Sergeant Dan Woods, brother of the bridegroom, also of Fort Stevens, acted as best man. Captain and Mrs. Lee Roy Woods and son Donald and Dr. and Mrs. D. L. Woods, of this city, were present at the ceremony. This is the first child married in the Lee Roy Woods family and the first grandchild in the D. L. Woods family.

WORK FOR PATRIOTIC MAN'S LEISURE MOMENTS

Tons of Wild Berries Could Be Saved by Organization of Little Folks

That there is a great opportunity for some patriotic citizen not otherwise engaged in war work to organize the children of the community into berry picking companies this summer and save the tons of food that will go to waste if no organized effort is made to save it, was one of the statements made by Rev. D. A. MacLeod, now in the Y. M. C. A. work at Camp Lewis, in one of his addresses at the Presbyterian church Sunday. This work could well be carried on by someone who has reached a point in life where he is unfit for hard labor but who yet wishes to be of material assistance to his country at this time.

This was also suggested as a chance for the children to demonstrate their patriotism and to be remunerated for their efforts.

Rev. MacLeod was greeted by a tremendous audience at the union meeting in the forenoon and there was a large attendance at the evening service.

ALTHOUGH NOT SUBJECT TO CALL ARE READY TO PERFORM DUTY

Cottage Grove Has the Distinction of Being Leader in Organization of Volunteer Company.

Cottage Grove probably is the first city in the state where those above and below draft age, or discharged from the service for physical disability have started the organization of a volunteer company for any service which the government may ask. The organization of the company is the suggestion of Major H. A. Metcalf, discharged from the coast artillery because of physical disability. Others with military training who have signed for the volunteer company are Lee Roy Woods, discharged from the coast artillery while the ranking captain of Oregon; A. A. Richmond, who has had 12 years of service and was top sergeant with Sixth company, from this city, when discharged; Wm. H. Ostrander, who was also a sergeant with Sixth company; Boone Shortridge, veteran of the Spanish-American war, and O. H. Willard, veteran of the Civil war. Others who have signed are J. E. Godard, C. H. Corson, Dale Wyatt, C. E. Humphrey, Bake Stewart and Elbert Bede. Only two of these, Corson and Wyatt, are in the draft age. All are members of the home guard company. There has been, so far, no solicitation for membership, and it is expected that a large number of names will be added as soon as publicity is given to the movement.

They have a tract of twenty million feet of timber to cut out. The mill will have a capacity of 25,000 feet. The families expect to move there the middle of this month.

Guns for Home Guard.

It is expected that the deputy sheriff's organization of the home guard will receive 50 or more guns this week for the use of the home guard company. They probably will be used at the drill next Tuesday evening. Sheriff Elkins expects to bring them up on a truck.

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DARKNESS WILL PREVAIL FOR 2 HOURS SATURDAY

For nearly two hours on Saturday afternoon Cottage Grove will be enshrouded in darkness, for the great solar eclipse, which is interesting scientists all over the world, will occur at that time. While Cottage Grove is directly in the path of the shadow of the moon which will obscure the sun, the totality of the eclipse here will be between 92 and 94 per cent, which is enough to make it very dark so that the stars will shine brightly. The zenith of the eclipse here will be attained at 3:57 o'clock.

MEN OF DRAFT AGE WITH STOLEN CAR CAUGHT HERE

Had Passed Worthless Checks at Creswell; Reticent About Registration Cards

Two bad check men in possession of a stolen car and of draft age were captured here Wednesday. The car belongs to Brazier Small, of Turner, and is a Saxon roadster.

Deputy Sheriff Pitcher was in Eugene that day when word came to the sheriff's office of the passing of a bad check at Creswell. "I passed those fellows on the road and I am certain they have got a stolen car," said Pitcher. "I'll overtake them at Cottage Grove."

Creswell is but 9 miles from here, while Eugene is 22, but Pitcher got here almost as quick as the men in the stolen car and found other deputy sheriffs just putting the men in jail. A phone message had come during Pitcher's absence telling of the stolen car, which was found at the Henry garage, and the men were quickly picked up. Sheriff Elkins came up immediately and took the birds to the county jail. They were reticent about giving their names and told conflicting stories as to why they didn't have registration cards with them. Later they gave their names as Ralph J. Hughes, aged 21, of Tangent, and George Holland, aged 29, of Portland.

Shortly after Deputy Sheriff Pitcher left Eugene the sheriff picked up a man wanted here for jumping a bond bill and whom Pitcher had gone to Eugene after.

LIBERTY BONDS MAY BE CONVERTED AFTER JULY 1

Banks Which Originally Sold Bonds May Accept for Conversion.

Liberty bonds of the first issue, and liberty bonds of the second issue, and liberty bonds obtained by converting the second issue can be converted into bonds of the third issue during the six months' period beginning May 9 and ending November 9, 1918.

Delivery of the bonds issued in conversion cannot be made prior to July 1, but bonds presented for conversion on or before that date will be retained by the treasury and a non-negotiable receipt issued therefor. Interest will be adjusted in each case between the government and the bondholder.

After November 9, 1918, no further rights of conversion will attach to the 4 per cent bonds, either the original bonds of the second loan or those obtained by conversion of bonds of the first loan. Bonds of the first issue, however, will still have the privilege of conversion into any bonds issued at a higher rate of interest than 3½ per cent, before the termination of the war. All of the 4½ per cent bonds are non-convertible.

Bonds for conversion may be surrendered to any bank.

All bonds issued upon conversion into 4½ per cent bonds will be dated May 9. The bonds secured upon conversion of the first loan and bonds obtained by conversion of bonds of the first loan into 4 per cent bonds will carry interest from June 15. Bonds issued upon conversion of 4 per cent bonds of the second issue will carry interest from May 15.
