If found to be sincere in their scruples by a special board of inquiry, they will be furloughed to work on farms

"Under no circumstances will con scientious objectors be discharged from their responsibilities under the selective service law," the order says, and instructions are renewed to military courtsmartial to try and punish all found to be insincere, defiant or active in attempting to convert others to their belief.

Money earned by the furloughed objectors in excess of a private's pay and subsistence is to go to the Red Cross, and the permission is to be continued only so long as the objector is reported by disinterested observers to be working to the best of his ability. Only 600 professed conscientious ob-
