### OBJECTORS TO BE PUT TO WORK

Washington—Drafted men claiming conscientious objection to military service and who have been found by army authorities to be sincere in refusing duty with non-combatant units as prescribed by President Wilson are to be segregated at Fort Leavenworth, Kan., under terms of an order announced by Secretary Baker.

If found to be sincere in their scruples by a special board of inquiry, they will be furloughed to work on farms as laborers at a private's pay.

"Under no circumstances will conscientious objectors be discharged from their responsibilities under the selective service law," the order says, and instructions are renewed to military courtsmartial to try and punish all found to be insincere, defiant or active in attempting to convert others to their belief.

Money earned by the furloughed objectors in excess of a private's pay and subsistence is to go to the Red Cross, and the permission is to be continued only so long as the objector is reported by disinterested observers to be working to the best of his ability.

Only 600 professed conscientious objectors have been reported among the 1,300,000 men called for military service under the draft.

### Warship Built in 17 1/2 Days.

Washington.—Establishment by American shipbuilders of a new world's record in warship construction was announced by Secretary Daniels in the launching at the Mare Island navy yard, San Francisco, of the torpedo boat destroyer Ward 17 1/2 days after the keel was laid.
