GERMAN DRIVE SWINGS TO WEST

Teutons Are Endeavoring to Crush In Salient at Soissons.

Paris.—French counter attacks drove the Germans back between the Cureq and the Marne, where the enemy is making its greatest effort to advance toward Paris, the French war office announced.

A violent German attack astride the main highway from Chateau Thierry to Paris, paralleling the north bank of the Marne, broke down under French fire. The German losses were heavy and hundreds of prisoners were taken.

Employing the Marne river as a shelter to their southern flank, the Germans are trying to push westward between the Oise and the Marne, it was indicated in the official statements.

The Germans' progress having been checked to the eastward and southward, they are now concentrating their efforts southwestward on the front between Noyon and Chateau Thierry, seeking to advance along the three great valleys of the Oise, Cureq and Marne.

But along everyone of these routes, now that the intentions of the German high command are revealed, the resistance is increasing hourly. As a result, the enemy's progress is proportionately decreasing.

The allies are now checking the German armies everywhere.

AMERICANS DRIVE GERMANS BACK

With the American Army in France —The American troops thrown into the present great battle on the front northwest of Chateau Thierry, in a brilliant bayonet attack, drove the Germans from Neuilly Wood, in which the enemy was attempting to establish himself, after occupying the village of Neuilly-le-Poterie in severe fighting.

The Germans poured a heavy machine gun fire into the American ranks, but the Americans rushed forward and destroyed the hastily erected machine gun positions on the edge of the woods. Continuing their advance, they engaged the Germans at close quarters, and cleared them entirely from their positions, driving them back upon the ruined village.

In a sharp combat, marked by the fierceness of the allied machine gun fire, French and American troops, fighting side by side, almost wiped out small German forces which had reached the left bank of the Marne near Jaugonne, east of Chateau Thierry. Most of the enemy survivors were rounded up in small groups and made prisoners.

GERMANS BOMB HOSPITALS

Canadian and American Red Cross Buildings Raided by German Airmen

With the British Army in France.—German airmen have bombed another hospital—this time a Canadian institution—and exacted a considerable toll of casualties. Among those killed by the explosion or flames was an American medical officer who was administering an anaesthetic to a British officer in the operating room. The raid occurred at 12:30 o'clock in the morning.

The hospital attacked was a large one and was marked by huge Red Cross signs.

With the American Army in France.—German airmen made a pretentious night raid on the area behind the American lines in Picardy. Bombs were dropped on all sides of one of the largest hospitals in a town many miles to the rear of the front. American and French wounded soldiers were carried to cellars and caves by American nurses and members of the American Red Cross.

Americans Win French Admiration

With the French Army on the Marne.—American troops made their presence felt at several points in the big battle, and won the admiration of their allied comrades. The town of Neuilly-la-Poterie, between Villers-Cotterets and Chateau Thierry, was the scene of the most violent combats, in which the Americans took part.

There, with their French comrades, they succeeded in throwing the Germans back.

When the Americans first came into action here the Germans were trying to enter Neuilly Wood. The enemy battalions were mowed down by the trans-Atlantic machine gunners, who later supported the French infantry in a counter attack, in which the enemy was forced to retire beyond the northern edge of the wood.
