EXPRESS YOUR OPINION.

In holy writ it is written, "Ask and ye shall receive." This advice doesn't always work out as simply as it is stated, but one thing has been demonstrated and that is that we get very few things that we don't ask for.

Despite this fact, there are many who let things take their natural course or trust to luck that things will come out to their liking without exertion on their part.

This was demonstrated last fall when the school board asked for an expression of opinion as to whether or not the manual training and domestic science and arts departments in the schools should be continued. Although this had been a subject of considerable discussion, many of those who had violently expressed themselves as to what they would think of a city that would do away with these departments were not on hand at the school meeting to express their opinion on the subject. The same was true of many who had inveighed against these departments and were equally violent in expressing their objections to spending the tax money to teach children something they should learn at home.

The result was that a resolution doing away with these departments received a small majority of a handful of votes, while the school directors were left in doubt as to the real wishes of the great majority of the taxpayers.

For this reason the same proposition will come up for action at the annual school meeting to be held next Monday afternoon. While the school board is in no way bound by the action of the voters at the annual meeting, or at any other meeting, the probabilities are that they will act in accordance with any resolution adopted upon this subject. That such is their intention is indicated by the fact that no instructors have yet been engaged for these departments for next year. It is, therefore, strictly up to the voters of the district to settle the matter to suit themselves.

The school board cannot be blamed for acting contrary to the wishes of voters of the district if left in ignorance of what those wishes are.


