 The N. W. White and J. A. Powell families and Mrs. H. Callison motored to Eugene Sunday to attend the funeral

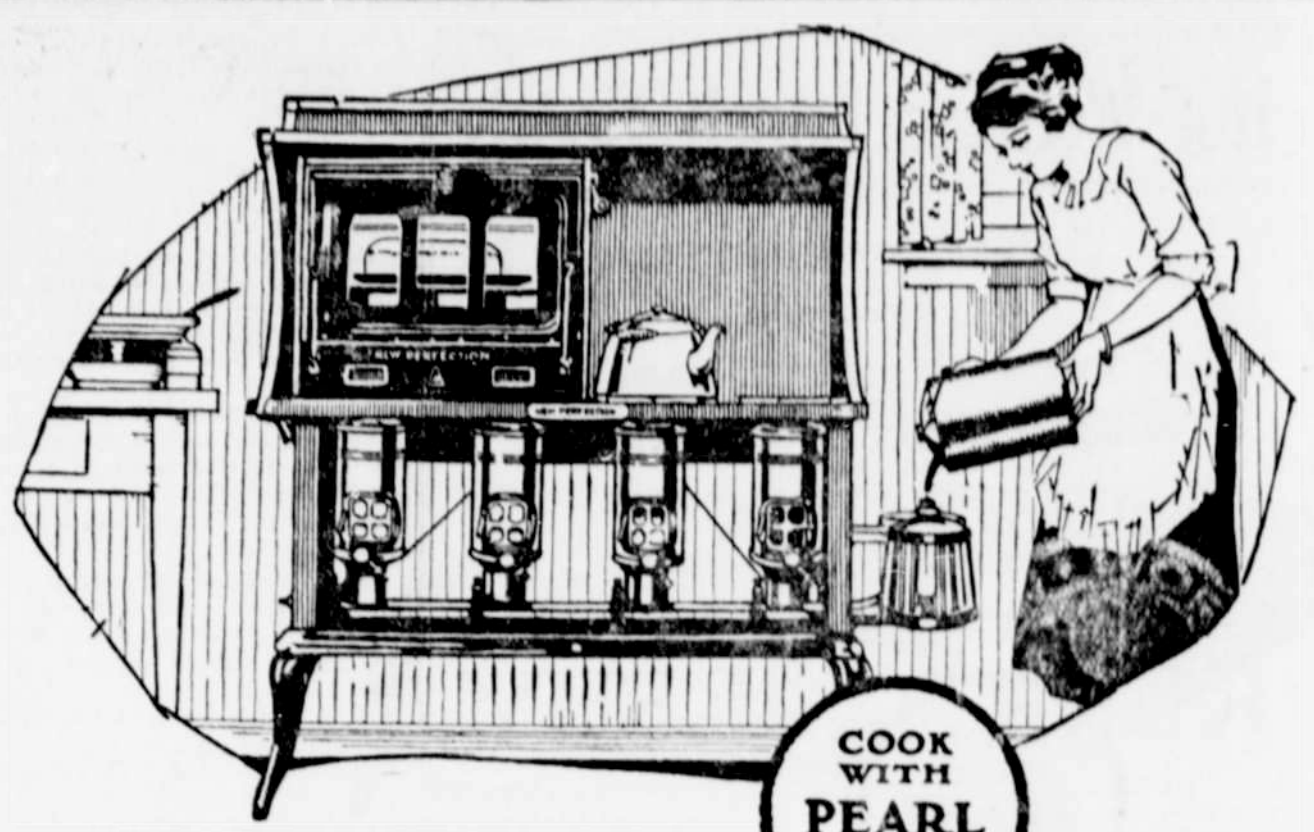

 Mrs. John Barker attended the graduation exercises at Eugene Friday. Her



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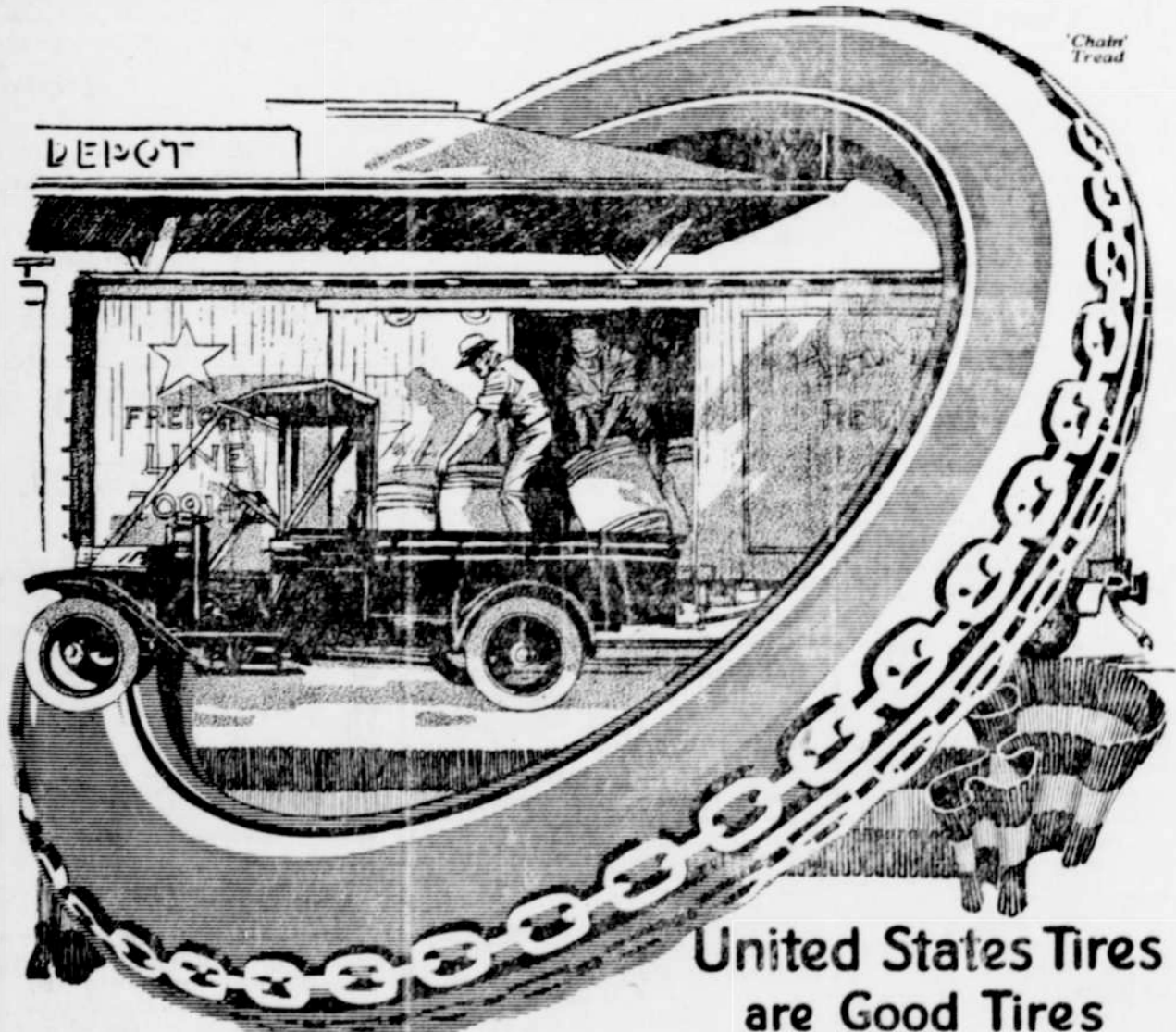
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sister, Mrs. Branstetter, and daughter Lucile accompanied her home for a week's visit. Miss Lucile was one of the graduates.
